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## Accidents Kill Four in Oregon

Four persons were killed Sunday in widely scattered Oregon highway mishaps, two of them by drowning in the Umpqua River and the others injured when cars plunged off roads, according to Associated Press.

Two teen agers, Elmer Edward Watts, 18, of Drew, and Rosemary Wright, 16, of Days Creek, drowned in the Umpqua River when the automobile in which they were passengers left the Tiller Trail Road south of Roseburg and submerged. State Police Sgt. Lyle Harrell reported William Ernest Watts, 24, driver of the car, escaped the car and swam ashore.

The girl's body was found in the car at dawn but her companion was dragged from the river bed hours later.

The car left the road about 1:30 a. m. Sunday as they were en route to Days Creek.

Ice on Pacific Highway 99 near Central Point was blamed for the death of Samuel H. Ackerman, 59, Klamath Falls business man whose car skidded out of control and overturned Sunday morning. His wife, Dorothy, suffered back and chest injuries. She is in a Medford hospital. The Ackermans were en route to Grants Pass to attend an Eagles Lodge convention.

The fourth victim was Mrs. Inez Janet Redmond, 32, Corvallis, who was a passenger in an automobile driven by her husband, Ray, when the car plunged off highway 99 West 11 miles south of Corvallis. They were en route home early Sunday morning from a dance at Alpine.

**Local Man's Son Killed in Wisconsin**

William Humphreys, 18, son of Charles Humphreys, Eugene, was killed Sunday at Fond Du Lac, Wis., when the car he was driving struck a culvert on the highway and overturned, Associated Press reported Monday. The father was in Chicago attending a convention at the time.

Killed with the boy was his fiancée, Katherine Gronauske, 19, of Milwaukee, Wis. The couple had recently announced their engagement, and were to have married soon.

Young Humphreys was a student at Madison High School. His father is a Eugene automobile dealer. Miss Gronauske was a student at Mount Mary College in Fond Du Lac.
