

Stry Rejects ber Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—Contention over restoration of price or controls on lumber distribution, black markets and actually construction costs were today by industry representatives urged the Senate Committee to reject the administration's proposal to take back under these rules.

A. Yeach, vice-president of the National Manufacturers Association, declared that lumber "just controlled without the payment of urgent needs of defense in time of war."

He said that if controls are "the inevitable result will be increased production, rising costs due to longer periods, illegal operation materials and no net to consumers."

Douglas, representing the Lumber Sales Company of Minn., declared that "it may be the case with other commodities in supply, price control will not be in producing lumber prices."

He said the law of supply and demand is the controlling factor in the price of lumber, and Chairman Tobey commented:

"It's a great phrase, supply and demand. Maybe it's the end of the cure-all. But there is law of avarice and greed."

Roads Normal Except for Ice

Clear weather and strong winds prevailed in the mountains Tuesday, the State Highway Department reported, but roads were normal except for a few patches of ice.
