

Army, Navy Bickering Hit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson charged Wednesday that Navy backwardness and jealousy of the Army jeopardized U. S. victory in the World War II battle of the Atlantic.

The 80-year-old former cabinet officer asserted in the Ladies' Home Journal that the Navy rejected Army proposals for use of radar-equipped airplanes against submarines at a time when German U-boats were sinking millions of tons of allied shipping.

Gave Both Credit
Stimson gave the Navy full marks for doing its part in winning the ultimate victories over Germany and Japan. And he agreed that the Army contributed its bit to inter-service bickering and rivalry. But, conceding personal bias, he directed his heaviest verbal blows against the Navy, which he particularly criticized.

"The peculiar psychology of the Navy Department which frequently seemed to retire from the realm of logic into a dim religious world in which Neptune was God, Mahan his prophet, and the United States Navy the only true church," Army-Navy Game

Stimson's views on the Navy are detailed in excerpts from his forthcoming biography, on Active Service, which the Journal is publishing under the title, "Time of Peril."

Stimson said inter-service rivalry begins in the academies and reaches a peak each year in the Army-Navy football game. He disclosed that during the war he tried vainly to get the annual service game called off in the interests of unity.

He expressed the hope that under the Unification Act of 1947 the services would "learn or be taught, to live together in friendship."

In the first 16 months of U. S. participation in the war, the Germans sank 7,000,000 tons of Allied shipping "mostly" in areas of American responsibility," Stimson said.

While this was a blow to naval pride, "it was the Army which more seriously felt the pinch." Early in the war, he and Gen. George C. Marshall, then Army chief of staff, proposed use of radar-equipped aircraft under a single command against U-boats.

But Adm. Ernest J. King, then chief of naval operations, insisted the escorted convoy was "the only way" to fight the submarine, and in June, 1942, the late Secretary of Navy Frank Knox asserted that "no airplane had ever sunk a submarine." Knox "corrected" this statement later, "but that he could make it at all was indicative of the blue-water attitude."

GM Charged In Labor Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board Wednesday charged General Motors Corp. with an unfair labor practice under the Taft-Hartley Law. He alleged it refused to bargain with the CIO Auto Workers Union on an insurance plan.

Denham's complaint to the NLRB was based on charges brought by the Union Jan. 22. A hearing was set for February 10.

NLRB officials said the formal complaint clears the way for Denham to seek a court order for General Motors to stop the alleged unfair labor practice.

Cadet Pilot Training Deadline Set Feb. 4

The deadline for examinations for aviation cadet pilot training has been set for Feb. 4, according to Major Carl Hornsby, station commander of the Army recruiting office in Eugene.

Applicants may secure necessary papers at Room 10 in the Eugene postoffice. Those passing preliminary tests will be flown to McChord Field from Portland on Feb. 6 for complete physical examinations, and appearance before the aviation cadet examining board. Age requirements are from 20 to 28½ years inclusive.

Deputy Collector Returns to Old Job

Frank C. Wheeler, Eugene, has been reappointed as a deputy collector in the internal revenue offices here, according to Fred Huber, deputy collector in charge.

Huber said that Wheeler had been on the local force two and a half years prior to being relieved last July when the government made a cut-back on personnel.

Huber also has announced the opening of the new internal revenue office in Roseburg. The office is manned by L. G. Shult of Portland, and comes under the jurisdiction of the Eugene office.

Roxas to Pardon Collaborators

MANILA (AP)—President Manuel Roxas said Wednesday he has signed a proclamation granting amnesty to collaborators with the Japanese, which will become effective if it is approved by the Philippine Congress.

The amnesty will affect only those accused of treason or political collaboration or trading with the Japanese.

It does not include spies and informers who worked with the Japanese or those who committed murder, robbery and other crimes to help the enemy or suppress the resistance movement.

During the 1948 election campaign when Roxas defeated Sergio Osmena (who spent the war years in America) for the new nation's presidency, Roxas was called a collaborator by the opposition party.

His election despite charges of collaboration was viewed by Filipino observers as an indication that so many Filipinos had "done business with" the Japanese that no lasting stigma could be attached to the term "collaborator."

As a preliminary step to the preparation of a 1948 list of coming events throughout the state, the Oregon State Highway Commission travel information department is seeking the cooperation of each Chamber of Commerce in Oregon, and other civic organizations, in obtaining dates of all festivals, derbies, celebrations, round-ups, pageants, fairs, livestock shows, and other special events.

Early receipts of information at the department's office will be appreciated, as well as information on approximate time when dates are to be set for coming events. Every effort will be made to have Oregon's list as complete and accurate as possible.

Student Tells Club Of War Experiences

Miss Fely Corcuera, University of Oregon student formerly of the Philippines, spoke at Eugene Hunt Club meeting Tuesday evening of her experiences as a night club entertainer in Manila during the war. The club catered to Japanese officers. As a member of the American underground, she was able to collect military secrets and to assist American prisoners.

Miss Corcuera, who is taking a post-graduate course in business administration, hopes to remain in the United States. She described the average Japanese as being "just people" and sang a Japanese song, one of more than 200 that she memorized during the war period.

Bank Robbed By Poisoner

TOKYO (AP)—Metropolitan police said Wednesday they expected soon to arrest the fiend who coolly poisoned Teikoku Bank employees—killing 12—and escaped with an estimated 154,000 yen (\$3280).

Inspector Horizaki Shigeki said the bizarre robbery was similar to two previous bank robbery attempts. As in the latest case, the robber posed as a public health official and induced employees to drink poison with the explanation it was an anti-dysentery medicine.

In the previous cases, the employees were only sickened.

Thousands of Japanese police are searching for a pallid, big-nosed Japanese with white hair. He entered the bank at closing time Monday, ordered 16 employees to drink the "medicine" and scooped up the currency as they writhed on the floor. Four are expected to recover.

Newspaper's 'Soul' in Will

RALEIGH (AP)—The will of the late Josephus Daniels, 85-year-old editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, showed Wednesday that he left the paper to his four sons to regard "not as property but as having an unpurchasable soul."

The will of the former Navy Secretary and Ambassador to Mexico who died here Jan. 15 was filed for probate this week. Except for minor bequests, the \$344,130 estate went to Daniels' sons, with provisions that the stock in the paper would eventually be divided among his grandchildren.

Forester Helps Select Timber

Charles R. Ross, extension forester from Oregon State College, Wednesday was helping four Lane County farmers select merchantable timber from farm woodlots, according to the county agent's office.

W. B. Parker, assistant county agent, who said the forester's services are available to any farmer desiring them, explained increased use of farm woodlots during the slack winter period at present sometimes increases a farmer's per acre income by as much as similar acreage in ordinary farm crops.

Parker said the land use committee of the Lane County Agricultural Council had recommended increased use of OSC's forestry service.

The 1924 production of "The Thief of Baghdad," starring Douglas Fairbanks and Anna May Wong, will be the feature of Movie Night on the University of Oregon campus at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday. Two continuous showings will be held in 207 Chapman Hall. The movies are open to the public.

Adult Class Term To Begin on Monday

Applications for a new six-week term in the adult general education development program of the city school system will be taken at Woodrow Wilson Junior High School next Monday night at 6:30 p. m. The first instruction periods of the new term will be held the same evening.

Thursday night of this week, those who attended classes dur-

ing the last term will be given their final examinations. The purpose of the adult classes, which anyone over 19 is eligible to attend, is to provide an opportunity for the completion of high school educations. The entire program runs nine months, and offers six courses. During the next term the courses offered will be English and U. S. history. Fees for the term are \$9.50 for initial registrants and \$7.50 for persons previously enrolled.
