

Public Hearing On Proposed Zoning Ordinance Changes

SPRINGFIELD—The city council has designated Thursday, Feb. 5 at 8 p.m. as the date and time for a public hearing to consider proposed changes in the new comprehensive zoning ordinance.

The hearing had originally been scheduled for the council meeting held last Monday but was postponed to give the city planning commission a chance to have another meeting before the hearing date.

The following changes in the zoning ordinance have been recommended by the planning commission:

1. To allow residents to keep poultry, rabbits and livestock in the city limits under certain conditions and requiring a annual permit fee of one dollar for poultry and rabbits and \$3 for livestock.
2. To authorize new and used

auto sales agencies and agricultural machine and supply agencies in the central business district zone providing such establishments are wholly within a closed building and require no curb cut.

3. To authorize the manufacture of formaldehyde, plastics and synthetic glues in light industrial classifications.

4. To zone the area, including the new Maple School, recently annexed to the city as first class residential.

If there is no opposition to the proposed changes at the public hearing, the zoning ordinance will be amended accordingly.

All State Roads Free of Snow

The State Highway Commission reported Wednesday that Government Camp has 34 inches of roadside snow, but that all roads are free of snow except for light streaks of ice on the shoulders.

Santiam Junction reports all roads normal with a few spots of ice which have been sanded and 50 inches of roadside snow. Roads to Odell Lake are clear with spots of packed snow near the summit and 44 inches of roadside snow.

Three-Year Terms Given Two Youths

Three years each in the state penitentiary were given to Richard Junior Morrison, 22, and Joseph Charles Tavis, 25, both of Eugene, by Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth Tuesday.

They are jointly charged with grand larceny in connection with the theft of an auto from Eugene. Morrison and Tavis were arrested in Albany after Morrison walked away from the Lane County jail where he was a trusty on Jan. 23.

Both pleaded guilty to the charge.

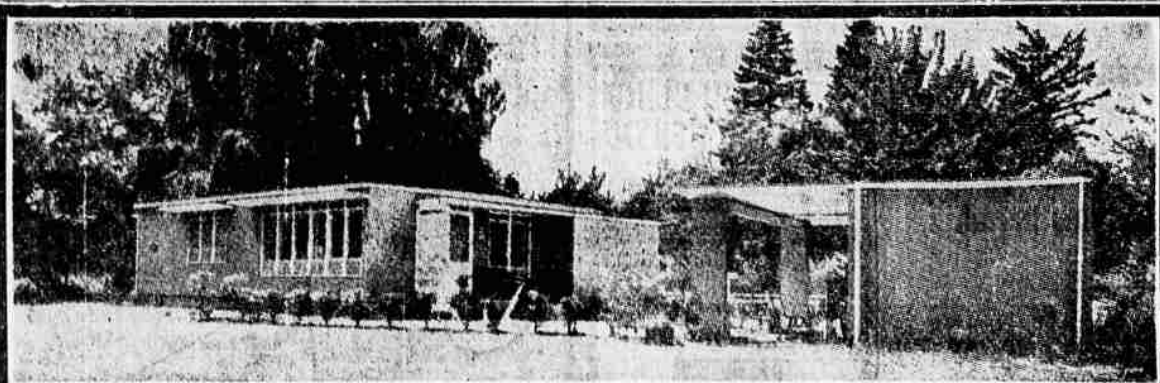
