The Philippine club, a local organization of veterans of the Spanish-American war who were in the Philippine Islands at the time of the beginning of the Filipino insurrection, Feb. 4, 1899, will hold its annual reunion and potluck dinner at the Eugene armory Sunday, Feb. 1.

Oratory Said Factor In League Rejection

Factors leading to the rejection of the League of Nations by the United States with the emphasis on the part played by oratory of opposing congressmen are discussed in a recent issue of the Quarterly Journal of Speech by Dr. Robert D. Clark, associate professor in the University of Oregon.

The points of the League adoption, according to the article, were eagerly seized upon by political figures to sway the public to their way of thinking. One of the unfortunate statements by President Wilson was the first point of his "fourteen point" program.

This plank, which called for "open covenants of peace openly arrived at," was interpreted by the opponents of the program to mean the day-by-day accounting of proceedings at the peace conferences.

When these accounts could not be released until agreements were negotiated, the oratorical opponents of the program covered the country with accusations of "bad faith" and strengthened the people's feeling against it.

Other points, particularly involving the rejection of the League by the United States, concerned the feared infringement of the Monroe Doctrine if the League program were adopted by this country, and the fact that England and each of her major possessions were to have a vote in the assembly although the U. S. was to have but one.

Dutch Said Doing Good Rebuilding Job

Praise for the way the Dutch are rebuilding their Nazi-ravaged country was expressed by Dr. Waldo L. Semon on his return from a Holland trip to his home in Akron, Ohio, recently.

Dr. Semon, the son of Frank E. Semon, 300 Harlow Road, Eugene, is director of pioneering research for B. F. Goodrich Co. He went to high school in what is now Eugene's city hall from 1912 to 1914.

"The spirit of the Dutch is wonderful," he reported. "It is obvious that they are not counting on American money to bring them back. There have been few if any strikes but Communists have stirred up trouble in some seaports."
