Elsewhere on the sports front,

Junction City takes on St. Mary's at the Armory, and Eugene travels to Cottage Grove.

This is the second time that these combinations have met—Eugene dumping Grove in the first meeting, 26-24, and Junction City beating St. Mary's 38-32 in their initial contest.

Simons Top Scorer

In Big Six play, two important games are booked for Friday, with another on Saturday's schedule. Salem goes to Bend for Friday seeking its sixth victory without a setback, while the same evening, Albany and Corvallis clash in a game that is more important as a district contest than a Big-Six fray. Saturday, Corvallis jaunts to Bend.

Junior Simons of Albany took over top spot in the league scoring with 82 points in six games. However, 13.7 average per game can't compare to Corvallis' Bob Edwards who has 74 in 4 games for a 18.5 average, or Bend's Bill Sheffield with a 17.2 average and 69 points for third spot. Salem's Carlos-Houck with 67 and Springfield's Kermit Chapman with 66 round out the big five.

Harold McCloskey continued to dominate the foul department — the Albany hoopster having committed 26 fouls in six games for a 4.3 average per contest.

Joe Gordon announced that Bobby Doerr, second-baseman for the Boston Red Sox, has been definitely signed to play in the polio benefit basketball exhibition at the Armory February 5 when his All-Stars meet the Fox Brothers in the feature game of a tripehead.

Gordon said he hopes to have an all-pro baseball starting lineup that will include Dick Whitman of the Brooklyn Dodgers, and two New York Yankees — Bill Bevens and Don Johnson. Bobby Anet and Wally Johnson, members of Oregon's 1939 NCAA championship quintet, will come out of retirement for the game. Others expected to see action are two pro football players — Jake Leicht of the Cleveland Browns and Chuck Elliott of the New York Yankees. Dick Strite, a member of Gordon's city championship quintet of pre-war vintage, will also be available.

The Fox Brothers will be making their second appearance as a unit. Howard, pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds, has been averaging 30 points per game with a Bend independent team; Everett and Delano are ace members of the Outdoor Store team in the City league, and Kenny has been playing in a Southern Oregon league. Fred and Mitchell are other members of the aggregation.

The City league games, one as a preliminary and one as a nightcap, will also be played that night. All receipts will be donated to the Lane County Sports Polio Fund.
