Old Whales Unearthed

BERKELEY, Cal. —(AP)— Ancient whales that lived in a great sea covering northern Africa and parts of the near East about 60,000,000 years ago have been unearthed by a University of California expedition, the university reported.

Wendell Phillips, leader of the university's Egyptian expedition, reported the ancient whales were slenderer and smaller than modern whales. They were meat eaters, with sharp teeth. Skulls and skeletal remains of whales collected showed some of them were between 30 and 40 feet in length.

The fossils were found in Zeuglodon Valley—the Valley of the Whales—which is about 60 miles from the expedition's headquarters at Kom Oshim, a large house provided by the Egyptian government in the Falyun region.

Phillips said the whales lived in the Tethys Sea, an overgrown Mediterranean of 60,000,000 years ago which covered the areas of the present Mediterranean, North Africa and extended to the Black and Caspian Seas and to parts of Arabia.
