Mill-Race Dispute Is Given "Going-Over" At Mass Protest Meet

COTTAGE GROVE—Discussion became heated at the meeting Wednesday evening of property-owners affected by the mill-race, and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Roy, owners of the Cottage Grove Flour Mill and the mill-race.

Ben Heinz, city manager, moderated the meeting, at which the property-owners aired their complaints about the mill-race growing too large, damaging or encroaching on their property, etc.

After several solutions were investigated, Roy made a final offer to lower the water level and to make "what repairs I can."

Heinz informed the group that all parties must come to a common agreement or the case must go to court. Property-owners elected a committee of three, R. B. Hill, Herman Miller, and R. H. Long-fellow, to try to come to a written agreement with Roy, which will also be submitted to the property-owners.

An Eugene veterinarian diagnosed one dog's symptoms as arsenic poisoning, which inflicts an agonizing death in convulsions. Many baits containing poison pills or capsules have been found in yards and along roads. A Winberry Creek citizen commented:

"If a child gets some of this poison perhaps the sheriff's office will do something. Several have complained to the sheriff and to the State Police but they say there is nothing they can do. People are getting mad. Most ranchers up this way have pindigreed hunting dogs."
