

Over Program earing Airs iff Opposition

EDFORD — (AP) — Opposition to the reclamation bureau's Rogue River development program left the hearing examiner with two alternative suggestions Thursday. On Wednesday's wind-up of the hearing on dams to provide irrigation, flood control and power, William Smith, Grants Pass attorney, said a tributary project on units on the Evans, Little and McNeil Creeks and in the Howard Prairie area would provide more water and power at a cost than would the bureau's proposed Lewis Creek dam on the main Rogue.

He said the bureau report, submitted at the hearing, was inadequate and incomplete.

William Voigt, Jr., Denver, attorney representing the Clark Walton League, said the bureau should scrap its plans and

take up another calling for integrated planning by all affected state and federal agencies to get full development without "destroying one of the natural resources."

Fishermen, backed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the state game commission, contend the reclamation bureau's program would seriously threaten sports fishing on the Rogue.

J. C. Denman, Medford, said diversion dams proposed by the bureau would practically wipe out upper river fishing, and irrigation dams through fluctuating and warming the water would adversely affect fish life.

He called the bureau report "speculative" and said the plan under which power would pay \$71,000,000 of the \$89,000,000 cost under the first of the bureau's two suggested programs was unsound.

Earlier statements that the decision properly rested with the people of the Rogue River Valley were criticized by Denman. He said \$300,000 has been spent by people from Oregon and other states for Rogue fishing development.

Brig. Gen. Ralph P. Cowgill, Salem, who said he had fathered the law prohibiting further dams on the upper Rogue, protested that sports fishing groups' time at the hearing had been cut short.

It appeared for a time that the hearing would extend into Thursday, but Harlan H. Barrows, Chicago, conducting the hearing, decided to wind it up Wednesday night.

Among others who testified Wednesday against the proposed development were: Kenneth Martin, Grants Pass, state game commission member; Dr. Paul Needham, game commission director; John Garrett, Portland, the Oregon fish commission; Charles Scott, Coos Bay, president of the Southwestern Oregon Sportsmen's Association; Al Gribble, Silverton, secretary of the Oregon division of the Izak Walton League; Ken Gates, Portland, representing the Multnomah Anglers and Hunters Club, and Mert Foltz, Eugene, of the Izak Walton League.

\$4,500 HELD LOW INCOME
NEW YORK — (AP) — State Supreme Court Justice Louis A. Valente ruled that a family with an income of \$4,500 a year is in the low income group now. He made the decision in dismissing a taxpayer's suit to bar the city from building 6,000 apartments for rental at \$12.50 a month to families in the low income group.

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
