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War Prevention Conference Sees Need for Informed Public

GRINNELL, Iowa, (Special)—That World War III can be prevented only if an informed public opinion demand that aggressive steps be taken is the theme of the National Conference for the Prevention of World War III, which opened at Grinnell College, Iowa, Thursday.
Such nationally known figures as Ely Culbertson, Dorothy Thompson and Norman Thomas, though differing considerably on details, agreed that revision of the United Nations Charter is necessary and that action by the "little people" is the only way changes in the charter can be forced through.
Culbertson, famous bridge expert and author of the "Quota Force" or "ABC plan" said the "If American foreign policy is confused, it is because public opinion is confused." An American citizen born in the Balkans and educated in France, Culbertson is chairman of the Citizens Committee for United Nations Reform.
Dorothy Thompson, noted newspaper columnist, is chairman of WOMAN—The World Organization of Mothers of All Nations. Her criticism of the present UN Charter is based on the fact that it has one law for the strong nations and another for the weak nations: "What the great powers agree on is the law for all. No matter how it may infringe on the rights of other nations. A major power, on the other hand, has a veto power and can prevent enforcement of any measure it does not approve," she said.
Socialist candidate for president, Norman Thomas, took a vacation from politics to recommend that even though we may not think Russia will agree to amendment of the UN charter, we should draft

the needed changes and present them." You don't know what Stalin will do until you try—and try again and again," he said. "We should make our appeal day and night, over and over again. Russia probably will not agree—at first. But I am more concerned that America take the lead."
An earlier discussion by Chester S. Williams, public liaison officer of the US mission to the United Nations, outlined the function of United States foreign policy through the UN.
He admitted that at the present time the UN cannot prevent a war between major powers. "However," he added, "we must not force Russia out of the UN. An organization composed entirely of nations which agree with us will not bring peace. Only an organization that includes those nations likely to disagree can hope for success."
