Talk on Cookery Given by Instructor For-Business Women

"Outdoor Cookery" was the topic of a talk given by Miss Mabel A. Wood, head of the home economics department at the University of Oregon, before the Eugene Business and Professional Women's Club Thursday noon at the Eugene Hotel. Miss Wood was presented by Mrs. Rachel Johnson, chairman of the publications committee.

"There is no difference in what an egg will do, whether you boil it indoors or out," Miss Wood said, in advancing a premise that outdoor cooking is simple. She instructs a class of men students annually in the art, she said, and they prepare a dinner consisting of planked salmon, baked potatoes, vegetables, and biscuits. She told the cooking methods in each case, the salmon on a plank, tipped before the fire, with strips of bacon laid across the nails which hold the split salmon (skin side down); the potatoes in a tightly-

covered can, with a little water in, so that they steam, then brown; vegetables cooked upon a grill, remembering to grease the kettles so they are easily cleaned of the black soot deposits; and biscuits baked in a reflector oven.

Election of Miss Genevieve Hallin as president of the club, to replace Mrs. Myrl Garnett, who had been elected but not installed when sickness forced her resignation, took place at the meeting. Mrs. David Barnhart was elected first vice-president, and Mrs. Leora McMurphy, second vice-president to fill the slate of officers, who will be installed later.
