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1000 Square Yards Painted For Veterans

How to paint 1000 square yards—the Veterans Memorial Building—in about four hours was well demonstrated Saturday when nearly 40 Eugene painters swarmed over the structure at Sixteenth and Willamette.

The mass painting came as official conclusion to the two-week Clean-Up, Fix-Up campaign being carried out by civic agencies.

The all volunteer work was sponsored by the Local Painters Union 1277, AFL, and Eugene Chapter of Painting and Decorating Contractors of America.

The Safeway Scaffold Co. furnished the platform which formed a network three tiers high around the structure and facilitated rapid work. Light rain restrained the painters for only half an hour.

Lunch was served in the building by auxiliaries to the veterans organizations.

Comptrollers Hear Economist Paul Ellis
The Pacific Coast Conference of the Comptrollers Institute of America was addressed Saturday by Dr. Paul W. Ellis, associate professor of economics at the University of Oregon on "Price Changes, Business Accounting and Government Policy."

Dr. Ellis discussed the problem of inflation and its effect on accounting for profits by business. He explained that "business accounting is misleading government officials and business itself into establishing policies which are a disadvantage to business."

The institute is an organization of top financial executives of large American corporations.

Carpenters Report Heavy Work Lists

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Learn To Swim Program Starts

The annual Lane County Red Cross learn-to-swim campaign, which last year resulted in instruction for more than 4000 youngsters in the county, opened this week in Eugene and Mapleton. Classes in many other county communities will begin soon.

Classes will start Tuesday at 9 a.m. to noon at the Anchorage, with Imogene Love and Harriet Minot instructing. There will be three classes of 40 students each during each two-week period. Eugene children may register for a later class by signing up at the Red Cross office, 43 Eighth Ave. W.

Classes for the Mapleton-Swiss-home area opened Monday, with Don and Wallace Ciochetti instructing. About 100 persons are expected to take the course, which will be taught in the Siuslaw River behind Swiss-home.

Last year more students registered for the classes than could be accommodated. By enlarging the program and staff, the Red Cross hopes this year to be able to take care of all children who sign up.
