Springfield Leads Junior Class Entries

PORTLAND, June 14.—(AP)—A perfect 100 smashes out of 100 shots earned E. D. Graham, Eugene, Ore., marksman, a favored spot for the state singles title as the Oregon trapshoot tournament entered its final rounds Monday.

Graham was competing in the Class "B" division. Dick Skeeters, Talent, Ore., was hot on his trail with 99x100.

In the Class "A" shooting, Clyde Fox, Klamath Falls, Ore., led with a 99x100, trailed by Robert L. Fox, Eugene, Ore., and Frank M. Troeh, Portland, with 98x100.

George Nelson, Florence, Ore., led in Class "C" gunnery with 97x100 with D. E. Nebergall, Albany, Ore., next with 95.

Everett Armstrong, Eugene, Ore., won the state preliminary handicap crown by cracking 96x100 at 21 yards. Armstrong lost a shoot-off tie with A. W. Vanderford, Payette, Ida., but Vanderford was ruled ineligible for out of state residence.

The mile run saw Jim Newcomb of Portland's Benson Tech high break the tape ahead of two Oregon State runners. Newcomb's time was 4 minutes, 24.6 seconds. The Benson ace trailed for three laps, then spurred for a spectacular driving finish to edge OSC's Jim Peterson into second place.

Emery Barnes, Jefferson High of Portland, tied for first in the high jump with Blair of the University of British Columbia. Their jumps were 5 feet, 10 inches. George Rasmussen, Oregon contender, was third.

Only college entry winning two firsts was Dave Henthorne, the ex-Klamath Falls star now sprinting under Oregon colors. He captured the 100 yard and the 220.

The high school and junior divisions saw no new marks. Franklin High of Portland dominated the high school division, winning first in the 440, 220, 880 relay, high jump and pole vault and taking second in nine events.

Springfield High entries captured the lion's share of the junior division, winning four firsts and placing men in six events.

Oregon's Lyle Dickey captured the pole vault crown with a leap of 12 feet, six inches. Leroy Cox of Franklin High School, Portland, finishing second and Don Pickens of Oregon copping third.

The Millers collected thirteen medals for their wins, with Gall Reynolds taking first in the discus, Merv Jenkins topping the mile field, John Lohr copping first in the pole vault and Reynolds again in the javelin.

Second and third in the broad jump, mile, and third in the relay gave the Millers 29 points, topping Benson's 26 and Albany's 11.

The performance bettered the previous record of William Smith, of Honolulu, of 9 minutes 50.9 seconds. Furuhashi's mark was made in the 50-meter pool in Tokyo during the triple meet of the Nihon, Rikkyo and Meiji universities.

Braves Take Pair from Reds; Yanks Celebrate With Win

The National League, noting its close pennant races, is staging one this year that promises to make all others look like runaways by comparison.

With the season nearly one third gone, the gap between the co-leading New York Giants and Boston Braves and the fourth place St. Louis Cardinals is only one and one-half games.

The tight situation does not end there. The fifth place Phillies of Philadelphia are only two and a half games off the pace. Only eight and a half games separate the last place Chicago Cubs from the leaders.

For comparative purposes, the fourth place Detroit Tigers in the American League are eight games in back of the pace-setting Cleveland Indians.

The tightest race ever staged in the National League involving more than two teams took place in 1908. The Cubs won the flag, finishing one game ahead of the Pirates and Giants, who tied for second.

Kiner Gets 17th The Braves, who dropped out of the lead Saturday when they suffered a double loss to Cincinnati, bounced back into a first place tie with the Giants Sunday by dumping the Reds twice in Cincinnati, 8-7 and 10-5. The Reds blew a six-run lead in the first inning. Eddie Stanley drove in Bobby Sturgeon with the winning run to climax a four-run ninth-inning rally.

The Braves scored early against the Reds and were never headed. The Giants and Cardinals split a couple of close decisions. The Giants won the first game, 3-2. A crowd of 32,000, largest of the season in St. Louis, saw the Cards snap a five-game losing streak.

Ralph Kiner hammered out his 16th and 17th home runs of the season to lead the Pirates to a 9-2 second game victory over Philadelphia after the Phils had copped the opener, 8-7.

Johnny Schmitz registered his sixth victory of the season and his third over Brooklyn when he hurled the Cubs to a 3-1 victory over the Dodgers in Chicago. The Southpaw yielded only four hits.

The New York Yankees salvaged the final of a four-game series with the Cleveland Indians, defeating Bob Feller and the Tribe, 5-3. Feller, Cleveland's ace right-hander, attempted to give the Indians a sweep of the four-game series, but suffered his sixth setback instead.

The Philadelphia Athletics split a doubleheader with the St. Louis Browns to creep within three games of the American League leading Indians. They won the second game, 3-1, after having dropped the opener, 7-5.

Carl Scheib scattered seven hits to register his fourth triumph in the afterpiece. The Tigers went above the .500 mark for the first time in weeks when they defeated the Senators in both ends of a doubleheader in Washington, 9-3 and 9-2.

Rain forced the postponement of the scheduled doubleheader in Boston between the Chicago White Sox and the Red Sox.

Athletic Hurler Gets Gate After Losing PHILADELPHIA, June 14.—(AP)—Nelson Potter, 36-year-old veteran relief pitcher, was fired by Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia Athletics Sunday.

Potter, who needs only 40 days to become a 10-year man, was discharged after losing the first game of the Athletics' doubleheader with the St. Louis Browns Sunday.

The 36-year-old veteran relieved Lou Brissie in the eighth inning with a 5-2 lead, the bases loaded and none out. He walked one and gave up three hits, which, complicated by Ray Coleman's error, permitted the Browns to win, 7-5.

"If that's the best you can do, get your check," Mack reportedly told Potter as he headed for the showers. The Athletics left for Pittsburgh Sunday night and Potter took another train for his home at Chicago.
