Russian border guards prevented 140 coal-carrying railway cars from entering Berlin from the western zones in two days and shut the auto bridge over the Elbe. Western Allied authorities reported. Only trains bound for western sections of Berlin were halted, officials said. Those destined for the Russian sector were unmolested. The Reds declared the coal cars were "defective." In the American zone, U. S. military policemen were detailed to guard nine locomotives in the Anhalter station, after Russians demanded that the U. S. give up six of them. The Russians said that all of the locomotives were not kept busy and should be turned over for Soviet use. U. S. rejected the demand. TIMBER COMES HIGH PRINEVILLE, Ore.—(U.P.)—The Ochoco Lumber Co. has bought the largest block of timber ever sold in the Ochoco national forest. The company submitted a high bid of \$1,142,475 for 67,000,000 feet of ponderosa pine, 4,500,000 feet of white fir and an unestimated amount of dead timber.

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Larger Mills Said Best Bet

Managing Forester E. H. MacDaniels of Forest Conservation, Inc., declared Friday, "good forestry is only one-half of forest management. Good manufacture is the other half."

Attacking "indecision" in Interior Department consideration of cooperative sustained agreements, MacDaniels called for recognition of the need for large mill operation in any good manufacturing practice.

Statement
 A recent statement of C. Girard Davidson, assistant secretary of

the Interior, called for renegotiation with Fischer Lumber Co. of Marcola, in cooperative agreement planning to avoid monopoly at the expense of small operators.

MacDaniels said, "small mills can seldom produce anything beyond rough green timber."

Citing the Simpson Logging Co., which has the first Cooperative Sustained Yield Unit near Shelton, Wash., MacDaniels said more than \$900,000 was paid in wages of the remanufacturing plant that was installed in the first year.

Utilization
 "The plant manufactured more than 12,000 carloads of saleable product without cutting an additional single tree. Such remanufacturing enterprises are, and must be, on a large scale," MacDaniels added.
