Not So Bad
 Actually, five-year-old Russell Hebert is a pleasant little chap who just wants to be able to live with this daddy again.

"Dad"—Will Hebert, who was hired a couple of months ago to supervise the Eugene police department's bureau of identification—never suspected that little Russ was such a demon until he started looking for a place to live in Eugene.

Hunt and Hunt
 Russell and his mother waited patiently in Portland while the head of the family hunted—and hunted—and hunted.

The entire Eugene police force joined Hebert in his search. They felt that they had taken a lot of other folks "in," so maybe they could find someone to take the Hebert family in.

Want ads in the "respectable-couple-with-well-mannered-boy" fashion were tried. All to no avail. Every time a new lead developed, it took only the mention of

five-year-old Russ to bring fear and trembling on the part of otherwise might-have-been landlords.

Officer Hebert learned in this manner what a horrible little creature he and his wife were attempting to bring into the quiet community of Eugene. Wednesday Hebert decided to try a different tact. Luxuries Given Expense Blame

One slant on today's home buying problems was given in Eugene this week by William Bell, managing director of the Western Retail Lumbermen's Assn.

Citing Bureau of Labor Statistics figures, he compared family expenditures in 1940 with 1946.

Luxury Spending
 "Present day budgets include a far greater luxury percentage than in 1940 and are a contributing factor in the inability of the average family to purchase homes. People are expecting their money to go a good deal further now," he said.

Bell said a drop in obvious luxury spending might mean a rise in savings sufficient to allow purchase of more reasonable family homes.

Gives Figures
 Calling for a sharp curb in above-income expenditure, Bell pointed to these comparative nationwide totals (in billions) as proof of increased luxury spending:

'The Meatball' Goes on Trial

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—After nearly a year of legal skirmishing and delays, American-born Tomoya (The Meatball) Kawakita goes on trial Friday for treason, charged with brutally mistreating Americans in a Japanese war prison camp.

The short, bespectacled ju-jitsu expert was running an export-import business here when one of his former prisoners spotted him in an east Los Angeles store. The FBI secretly investigated his activities for months before he was arrested on the charge, which carries a possible death sentence.

Kawakita, 26, was born and educated in Calexico, Cal. He went to Japan in 1939 as a student, and was interned at the outbreak of World War II. Later he was made an interpreter and assistant foreman at the Oeyama war prisoner camp.

FBI Agent Richard B. Hood said Kawakita and other guards assertedly knocked J. C. Grant, Clarksville, Ga., into the camp's cesspool on an icy winter day, and kept him in the filthy tank for hours. Another prisoner, Thomas J. O'Connor of Miami Beach, Fla., was beaten into temporary insanity by Kawakita, Hood said.

Other witnesses told the FBI that Kawakita assigned them to impossible tasks.

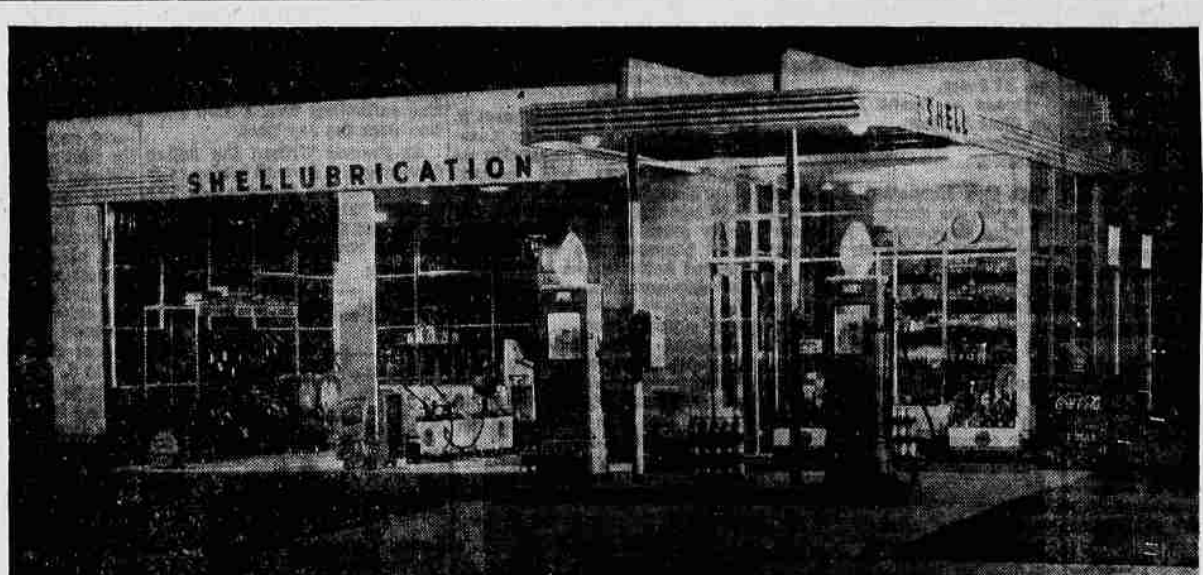
