In the progress, or more properly this stage, of American civilization, the time has come for the "Pause that Refreshes Our Minds." The average American home is a far cry from the ideal home. This is due to a number of factors, all of which can be traced to the lack of vital religion and its influence.

Inasmuch as homes are made of individuals and the degree of idealism in the home depends on the ability of these individuals to replace selfishness with altruism, our problem is basically a personality problem.

lem. You may use psychological, philosophical, or sociological terms to describe the personality abnormalities, but the problem still remains one of sin. The words of Jesus of Nazareth, "Ye must be born again" are the only solution to this problem.

Now this transforming power is a far cry from hypocritical profession, empty formalism, and the prevalent religious veneer that characterizes many American individuals and homes today. Again we quote the Lord Jesus Christ of Nazareth, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, all thy soul and all thy strength," and again, "They that worship God must worship him in spirit and in truth."

Vital religion will lift the below-average or average American home to the point where it approaches the ideal. It is doing just that for many who are establishing homes in this month of June. It will do the same for all who give it a fair trial.
