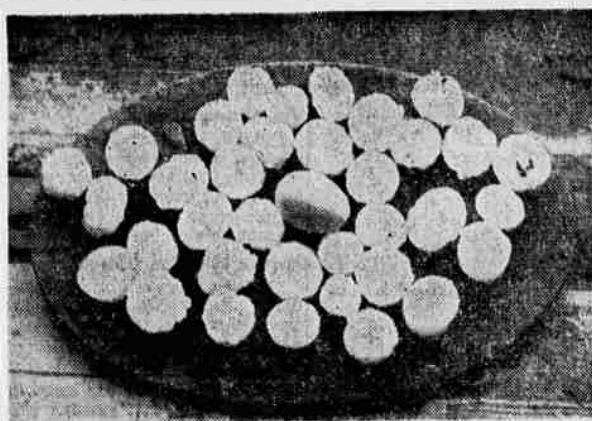

Monroe Considers School Problems

MONROE — Just a reminder! The annual school meeting is Monday, June 21, 8 p. m., at the grade school here. Purpose of the meeting is to elect one director for a three-year term.

A vote will also be taken on increasing the tax levy over the amount limited by law in order to raise the amount necessary to cover the deficit between the budget and the amount allowed by the county rural school board.

Our school budget for next year calls for \$28,820. The county rural school board allows for only \$23,126. Deficit to be raised by increase in tax levy is \$5,694.

Because of the recent school consolidation here with Ingram Island, the grade school sinking fund will also be adjusted and renewed at this meeting.

At the discussion meeting on the Monroe Grade School building held here June 11, the architect, C. A. Freeman of Portland, who was present as leader, was hired by the board of directors to make a thorough check on our present building and submit estimate of complete cost for all needed repairs to place us standard. This will be done at once and the report read at the annual school meeting June 21.

From the figures submitted by the architect it will be determined whether to repair the old building or build new.

The main trouble with our present building is the foundation is gone. It tips westward with the southwest corner badly sunk in the ground. It is in danger of falling and, if kept, must be stationed and strengthened by the fall term of school.

With regard to the interior, according to the report from the State Department, read by our county school superintendent, our Monroe grade school is non-standard along the following seven lines:

Lighting, wiring, fire hazards, toilets, cloak rooms, art supplies especially for painting, and library.

In order to continue to receive state aid our school must be brought up to standard requirements. This can be done gradually, but the move must begin at once.

Freeman showed a number of colored slides on up-to-date schools in Oregon.

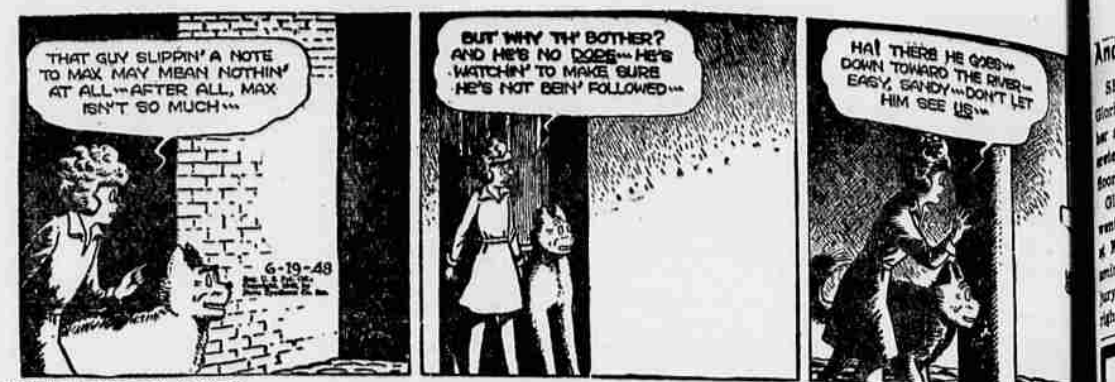
CENTRAL DOINGS
