

University Receives Cash Gifts Of \$480,116 for Various Studies

Cash gifts of \$480,116.24 during the school year have been acknowledged by the University of Oregon. The sum of \$243,819.77 was given for use in the several divisions and activities on the Eugene campus. The university medical school in Portland received \$236,296.47.

The largest single amount \$136,351, came from the U. S. public housing administration for the completion of 100 apartments in the Amazon housing project to house married student veterans and their families.

The university also received, in addition to cash gifts, numerous book, periodicals, historical documents and a wide variety of miscellaneous articles which will be housed in the libraries and museums.

Large gift sums received included

\$37,000 from the estate of Louise B. Schrott to establish the Schrott art student loan fund; \$17,115 from the Miner chair in real estate, an endowment in Eugene; \$7970 from the National Academy of Sciences, a research grant for the investigation of Micronesian anthropology under the direction of Dr. Homer G. Barnett; \$5150 from Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Jones and Mrs. Eleanor Jones Mumm, all of Eugene, to establish the Robert C. Jones Memorial scholarship endowment fund; \$7124.91 from the Kenneth A. J. Mackenzie fund; \$4000 from the Research Corp. of New York to Dr. Frederick William Paul for research in physics; \$3241.38 from the federal land grant of 1850; \$2400 from Research Corp. to Dr. Hans Heymann for research in chemistry; \$2222.20 from the Villard library book fund; and \$2142.50 from the Oregon State Dental Assn. for research at the dental school.

Peace Plans Explanation Set

Eugene will have an opportunity Wednesday to hear an explanation of the World Federalist movement from one of its prime-movers, James Avery-Joyce, prominent London lawyer and candidate for the House of Commons.

The 8 p. m. (the Louis-Wolcott fight is to be aired at 8) meeting in Woodrow Wilson Jr. High auditorium is open to the public and there is no admission charge.

The program is sponsored by the Eugene Council on World Affairs which has also brought such speakers on international subjects as Frank Munk of Reed College, and O. Merideth Wilson of Utah, to Eugene audiences.

Avery-Joyce (no kin of Lord Haw-Haw Joyce or Novelist James Joyce) is visiting the United States to campaign for the World Citizenship movement, which hopes to prevent war by forming a world government.

Avery-Joyce became interested in the educational program of the Eugene Council on World Affairs while attending the Grinnell, Ia., conference last week on the prevention of World War III. He met Chairman Ray Siegenthaler and agreed to speak in Eugene while on the west coast.

The Eugene group, not endorsing any "specific plan for world peace," follows a policy of inviting the proponents of as many plans as possible to Eugene, so the public may be better informed on world affairs, Siegenthaler said.

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Four Major Peace Proposals Put Forth at Anti-War Meet

Chairman Ray Siegenthaler of the Eugene Council on World Affairs, back in Eugene Friday after a week at the National Conference for the Prevention of World War III, said that four major proposals, all backed by large groups of citizens, were put forward at the convention as the means for the prevention of war.

The proposals are: Stick to the United Nations, make it work, without substantial revision of the charter; Quota Force, or ABC Plan, whose chief proponent is Ely Culbertson.

The Quota Force refers to the distribution of troops under a revised United Nations international

Delegates from nearly all AFL locals will attend the state federation of labor meeting this week in Salem. The meeting will be held at the Salem Armory, beginning Monday and probably lasting throughout most of the week.

6500 Make Use Of Play Areas

The city program of supervised recreation drew 6500 people — youngsters and adults — to playground areas and the Anchorage swimming pool in the first five days of its 1948 operation.

Don January, superintendent of parks and recreation, reported Saturday that this mark almost recorded during the first days of doubled the 3375 attendance figure last summer's schedule.

The increase, he added, is a natural result of the opening of the city's new play areas. Over 2000 persons attended Tuesday night's gala opening of softball league play at the Nineteenth and Lawrence playground, he said.

Although cool weather greeted the opening of Anchorage pool Tuesday, large crowds enjoyed its facilities for the rest of the week, January reported.

Interest in the games at Nineteenth and Lawrence has prompted the preparation of off-street parking space near that playground. January said that city park crews are now at work grading and graveling spaces on the south side of Nineteenth and on the east side of Washington. This work, he said, will be completed next week.

James Avery - Joyce, London lawyer and candidate for Commons, will explain the United

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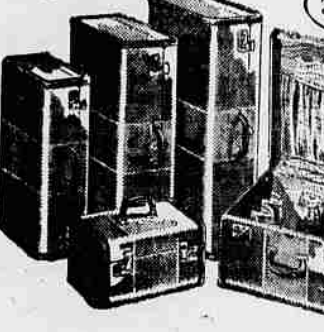
