Shields Gets Goshen Contract; Plan Calls for Modern Structure

A contract for construction of
the new Goshen Grade School was
awarded to Wayne H. Shields
Monday evening by the Goshen
School board. Shield's basic bid
was \$51,735.42, with the following
figures for alternates: No. 1, \$3392,
No. 2, \$105, and No. 3, \$189.

Construction of the school will
start within a week. The plan
calls for an ultimate layout of 12
classrooms with complete facilities
for recreation and health pro-
grams. The Shield bid covers the
first step in the building program,
including four classrooms, toilet
facilities and heating system.

Classrooms

The school will have classrooms
of the latest square plan, bilater-
ally lighted, and with movable
sectional fixtures and a sink in
each room.

This structural system is adapt-
able to moving of classroom walls
for larger or smaller classrooms.
Classrooms will feed into a natu-
rally lighted corridor from one side
only.

The school building will be dry
wall construction, with fir ply-
wood on walls and firtex board on
