Ban on Fireworks Covers All Classes

The sale of fireworks—as well as their use or possession—is absolutely illegal in Eugene, Fire Marshal Lester Barker warned Wednesday.

The ban includes non-exploding pyrotechnics, too. Even sparklers. Barker reported that he has found several dealers in violation of the ordinance and warned them to discontinue further fireworks sales.

With adequate publicity having been given the city's prohibition of fireworks, the fire marshal warned that any further violations will result in prosecution. The city ordinance provides for fines up to \$100, or up to 60 days in jail for non-payment.

While Barker was issuing his warning to dealers, the municipal court records showed another \$10 fine levied against a Eugenean for shooting firecrackers in the city. Cecil J. McCallister, 1457 Twelfth Ave. W., paid the penalty at a Monday court session.

The youth wrecked the stolen car in an accident at the intersection of Tenth and Monroe Sts. Tuesday at 5:45 p.m. After colliding with a coupe driven by James L. Woad, 512 Twelfth Ave. W., the car the boy was driving broke off a fire hydrant on the street corner.

Too Fast
 The youth was traveling too fast, investigating officers reported. The car he was driving was registered to Chester O. Broders, Corvallis, and the boy later admitted having stolen it from a Springfield motor court. He also confessed, officers reported, that he had taken a wallet containing \$42, a ring and a cigarette lighter.

Found Dazed
 The youth disappeared from the scene of the accident before officers arrived, but was found nearby in a dazed condition. He was taken to the Eugene hospital for treatment of head bruises and then placed in the detention room at police headquarters.

Although damage to Woad's car was relatively light, police stated that Broders' vehicle was a total loss after the collision.

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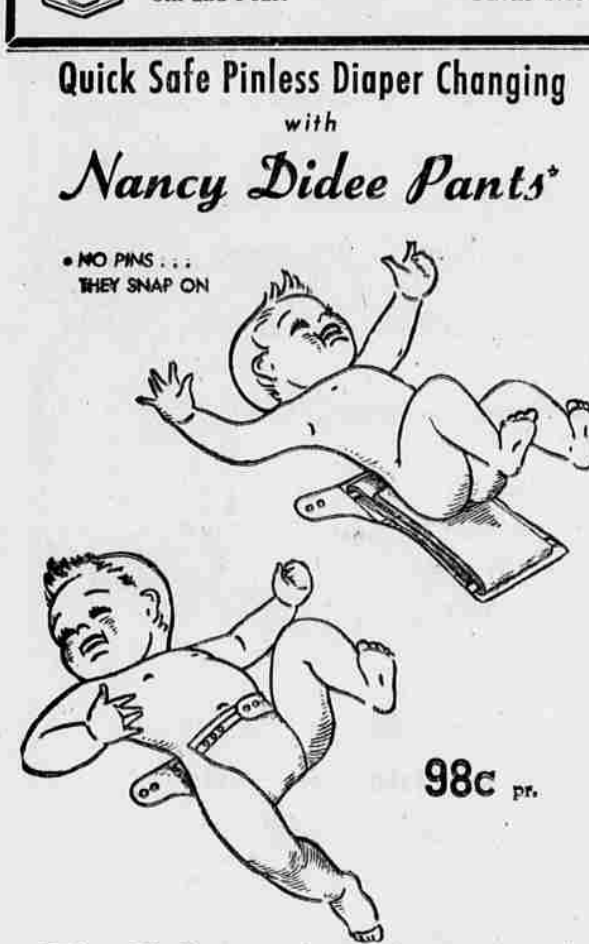
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
