The last day of June will bring to a formal close the Security Loan Drive and Lane County is far from reaching its quota. Only about 35 per cent of the goal of \$1,550,000 has been purchased to date.

Reuther, in Hospital, Registers Malaria

DETROIT — (AP) — Walter P. Reuther's personal physician said Friday that the United Auto Workers president has malaria but that the disease would not impair his recovery from wounds received in an attempt on his life. Dr. Raymond A. Sokolov said the union leader may have contracted the disease as long as 15 years ago during his wide travels. He said the disease may have made its appearance now because Reuther's resistance was lowered when his right arm was shattered by a gunshot blast from an unknown assailant.

Arthur Brown

Arthur Brown, 76, Salem, died at a local hospital Thursday. A resident of Oregon for 52 years, he crossed the plains in a covered wagon from Nebraska with his wife, Edna, in 1896. He was born Jan. 20, 1872, in South Dakota. A lifetime member of the Methodist Church, he was active for 30 years in the Oregon State Grange.

He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Katherine Peavey, Salinas, Calif., and Mrs. Rachel Fischer, Eugene; four sons, Carleton, Salem, Robert, Salem, Claude, Vancouver, Wash., and Ross, Roseburg; several grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Beesie Wheeler, Camas Valley, and a brother, Frank Brown, Camas Valley.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. with interment Monday at 2 p.m. in the Camas Valley Cemetery. Walter Smith Funeral Home of Independence is in charge of arrangements.

Storms Lash East Coasts

NEW YORK — (AP) — Sudden thunderstorms lashed the middle eastern seaboard Thursday night, causing property damage and accidents and breaking heat waves in the Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York City areas. Power lines fell and trees were uprooted in Baltimore as rainfall was accompanied by winds up to 75 miles per hour. Earlier, the city had baked in its hottest June 24 since 1894 as the mercury hit an official high of 97.3 at 2:30 p. m. (EST).

The winds left a trail of damaged crops, roofless barns and darkened homes in central Maryland, and farmers said damage was considerable.

In Philadelphia, gale winds reaching better than 60 miles per hour lifted rooftops, uprooted trees and caused numerous accidents, police reported. The thermometer there skidded from a 95-degree high to 70 degrees.

A nine-tenths of an inch downpour in New York City broke an 89-degree high for the year and dropped temperatures 20 degrees in three hours.
