

# Tito Ousted From Party For Actions

## Communists Purge Yugoslavs For 'Playing with Imperialists'

PRAGUE—(UP)—Russia read Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia out of the Communist Party Monday on grounds that he has been playing too close to western imperialism.

A communistic publication in the Communist newspaper Pravda here revealed that Yugoslav Communists were ousted from the Cominform (the Communist information bureau) at a secret meeting held in Romania.

It charged Tito and his supporters in the Yugoslav government with almost every crime in the Communist book—ranging from Trotskyism and anti-Sovietism to "ineptness" and "false demagogic tactics."

It said bluntly that the Yugoslav leaders deserted "internationalist traditions" to "play with imperialists." By its actions, the communistic publication placed itself "outside the ranks of brotherly Communist parties, outside the united Communist front, and thus also outside the ranks of the information bureau."

The communistic did not call for specific sanctions against Tito, but for a long time one of the most trusted followers of President Joseph Stalin of Russia, and his supporters.

But it did call upon the "healthy forces" of Yugoslav Communism to "lead the way" to the error of their ways.

The announcement here was made as marking a wide-open break in the Russian front in eastern Europe. It was the first definite confirmation of repeated rumors that all has not been going well between the Soviet Union and some of its satellites.

Pravda published a communistic report that meeting of the Cominform was held in Bucharest—at which a "situation in the Communist party" of Yugoslavia was discussed.

It added that Yugoslav Communists "refused to come to the meeting" of the information bureau.

## Nominees Chart Political Course

PAWLING, N.Y.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Republican presidential nominee, and Gov. Earl Warren, his running mate, will confer here Tuesday to map out a vigorous campaign.

A Dewey aide indicated one of the major subjects they will discuss is how to prevent overconfidence in a November GOP victory.

Warren and his family will leave for New York City.

The California governor arrived in New York with his family Sunday. Dewey and his family have been resting here since the national convention in Philadelphia.

Dewey and Warren are expected to spend the entire day Tuesday discussing the campaign situation. Dewey probably will return to Albany Wednesday.

At their conference, it is understood, Dewey and Warren will start a vigorous campaign that will take them across the country several times.

It was pointed out here that the Republicans face the job not only of winning the presidency and vice-presidency, but of defeating opposition in contests for Senate and House seats and for many state and local offices.

## Moore Lodge to Honor Supreme Governor

A class of 100 candidates will be initiated into the Moore Lodge No. 2, which will visit the local lodge Monday night.

## Witness Gets Sentence

PORTLAND—(AP)—Joe Berry, 28, who turned state's witness in the Sweet Home and Oak Grove bank robberies, was ordered to serve three years' imprisonment for his part in the robberies.

The sentence was meted in federal court after assistant U. S. Attorney Edward B. Twining told the court that "without the testimony of Berry it would have been hopeless to try and convict the others."

## Another State? Brooklyn Man Nearly Does It

ASBURY PARK, N. J.—(AP)—Ed Scott took his place Monday beside the Brooklyn Dodgers and the tree.

He brought a short-lived flurry of fame to Flatbush here Sunday at the opening of a "salute to the flags" ceremony.

Startled officials quickly detected something wrong as the program got under way. The mile-long display of colors was to include the flags of the 48 states mounted on halyards 20 feet apart.

But where California should have been there was only Scott. He was found on the pole trying to raise what he described as the flag of Brooklyn.

Both Scott and the flag came down fighting.

"Brooklyn is as good as California anytime," protested Scott.

## One Man Killed; Others Injured On Highways

Summer driving began to take its toll in accidents this weekend in Lane County, as one man died and several other persons were injured.

Dead was Walter G. Jenkins, 50, of Elmira, who was riding in a truck with several other persons on Highway 36 about 14 miles west of Highway 99 Sunday morning.

Thrown from Truck  
Driver of the truck was Leroy Gerald Jenkins, of Veneta, and there were about eight others in the truck. Water Jenkins was thrown from the truck when the vehicle hit a bad chuck hole on the highway, landed on his head, and was instantly killed.

Ray Anstine, Rt. 1, Junction City, a passenger, was taken to Sacred Heart Hospital by Arrow ambulance where he was reported in fair condition Monday. State police said the truck tipped over. The Lane County coroner's office aided in the investigation.

Three-Car Crash  
Several persons were injured in a three-car collision near Pleasant Hill on Highway 58 Sunday afternoon. State police records showed. A car driven by Louise Achitiga, Tacoma, Wash., started to pass a car driven by Gustav A. Bostron, 2844 Potter St., Eugene, on the crest of a hill, officers said. They met a car driven by Ted Stewart, Corvallis, headed east.

Bostron was given first aid at Sacred Heart Hospital and released. A passenger, Margaret F. Bostron, was reported in good condition at the hospital Monday. She suffered a compound fracture of the right arm and internal injuries. Greta Bostron, another passenger, was treated for shock.

Injured Seriously  
Fern Hall, Glendale, Calif., a passenger in the Stewart auto, was reported in serious condition at Sacred Heart Hospital Monday. No persons in the eastbound car were injured.

An accident at Oakridge near midnight Sunday completely demolished a truck driven by Ronald Jones, of Willamette City. The truck collided with a car driven by Floyd Rajter, Westfir. Davis L. Bryant, Westfir, owner of the car, was a passenger. The trio suffered only minor injuries.

## Chicago Job Printers Settle for Raise

CHICAGO—(AP)—A wage boost of \$11.89 a week was reported Saturday to have been accepted by about 1800 Chicago commercial printers.

A spokesman for Local 16 of the International Typographical Union said the members voted "about 1300 to 300" to accept the raise, proposed by the Franklin Association which represents the city's major job printing companies.

The 1800 printers have not been working since March 2.

The new scale provides for \$92 a week, 38 1/2 hours of work a week, \$97.08 for 38 1/2 hours of night work, and \$97.08 for 32 1/2 hours on the third shift starting about midnight.

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## 250,000 Men Goal of Draft For First Year

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army announced Monday that it expects to induct from 225,000 to 250,000 men from July 1 to June 30, 1949, under the peacetime draft law.

The draftees, aged 18-through-25, will serve for 21 months. Inductions probably will start about Sept. 22.

About 30,000 men per month will be inducted into the Army. Secretary of Army Kenneth C. Royall gave the figures at a news conference as he disclosed plans for the new draft machinery.

Others by Volunteer  
The "somewhat limited immediate requirements" of the Navy and Air Force probably will be filled by volunteer recruits, Royall said. The Army will get most of the draftees.

The draft act provides for registration of those 18-through-25. Selective service said locals boards probably will begin registration Aug. 16.

The Army expects to get 110,000 eighteen-year-old volunteers in the next year, Royall said.

These 18-year-olds may sign up for one year active training. These youths can get out of the 21-month draft by volunteering for the one year and then signing up in the reserve for six years.

Basic Training  
Both draftees and volunteers will get eight weeks basic training. At the end of this period inductees may remain in the U.S. or go overseas. No 18-year-olds volunteering for one year will be sent outside of the U.S.

Royall announced four new training divisions will be activated: 100th Infantry (Mountain) Division, Ft. Riley, Kans.; 5th Armored Division, Camp Chaffee, Ark.; 101st Airborne Division, Camp Breckenridge, Ky.; and 17th Airborne Division, Camp Pickett, Va.

Training divisions already in operation include: 4th Infantry Division, Ft. Ord, Cal.; 8th Infantry Division, Ft. Jackson, S. C.; 9th Infantry Division, Ft. Dix, N. J.; and 3rd Armored Division, Ft. Knox, Ky.

Count Gives Peace Plans

RHODES—(AP)—Jews and Arabs received from Count Folke Bernadotte Monday his proposals for peace in Palestine. Bernadotte is the United Nations mediator who brought about the current four-week armistice.

The suggestions which the mediator called a "basis for further discussion," were not published.

Premier Jamil Mardambee of Syria said later in Damascus the proposals had been received and will "in no way modify our attitude or rejecting partition and a Jewish state in Palestine." Jews are just as insistent that the new state of Israel must continue to exist.

Israeli experts who have talked with Bernadotte on Rhodes are to go back to Tel Aviv with his ideas Monday, he said.

Arab experts will not leave until they learn definitely where Arab League delegates are meeting Tuesday, the mediator said.

Veto Kills Bill

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The White House announced Monday President Truman's pocket veto of a bill providing for restoration of the home of Francis Scott Key, author of the "Star Spangled Banner."

Mr. Truman let the bill die by failing to act on it within the required time, Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said. The measure would have authorized an appropriation of \$85,000 for work on the home here.

Booth-Kelly Workers Off

Approximately 180 employees, by union figures, failed to report for work Monday morning at the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company plant in Springfield. Union officials said that the men are not out on strike, but weren't working Monday.

Max Gardner, financial secretary of IWA-CIO Local 5-246, said that a union committee decided on the work stoppage which was called this morning. The union and the company have been negotiating over wage adjustments and seniority rights in case of certain workers.

The workmen's committee met Monday noon with officials of Booth-Kelly. After the conference, the union committee decided to return to work Tuesday and continue negotiations, subject to the local's approval.

Members of the IWA local were scheduled to meet late Monday afternoon to take action on the committee's decision.

Gardner said Monday that company officials believed a satisfactory settlement could be worked out if the men go back to work.

Company officials were not available for comment.

## Food Barges Reach Berlin

BERLIN—(AP)—A crack appeared in the Russian blockade of Berlin Monday as British authorities announced that 10 barges carrying food and freight from western Germany reached the German capital.

Several more barges have been allowed to cross the border of the Soviet zone enroute to Berlin, the British authorities said. These were the first to cross the border since the Russians closed the boundary to all surface traffic to Berlin from the West on June 19, after announcement of currency reform in the western zone.

Not Clear Yet  
It was not clear yet whether the Russian blockade against western supplies for the American, British and French establishments in Berlin and for the 2,500,000 Germans in the capital who depend upon the western powers for food would be relaxed entirely.

The barge movements, which the British said returned waterborne freight traffic to Berlin to "normal," came as the U.S. and Britain used great fleets of transport planes to fly a double tonnage of supplies into the German capital, and imposed a stiff ration system to stave off the threat of starvation as a result of the Russian blockade.

Earlier Monday there had been a fairly serious riot among thousands of Germans waiting before the Russian central currency exchange office in the Soviet sector of Berlin to exchange old marks for new under the Soviet currency reform scheme.

## Political Forces Move to Draft 'Ike' for Demos

With the Democratic national convention just two weeks off, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the wartime "wonder man," was the man who had everybody wondering Monday.

The Ike-for President bandwagon was rolling merrily along, despite the general's insistence that he doesn't want to be in the driver's seat.

Two organizations—Americans for Democratic Action and Veterans for Eisenhower—were out to swing the District of Columbia's 12-man delegation to him in Monday's Democratic primary.

Cheers Set Off  
A draft-Eisenhower motion touched off a bedlam of cheers, whistles and shouts of approval from Wisconsin Democrats Sunday night at their state convention in Madison. But the convention was hastily adjourned before the proposal could be put to a vote.

In Minneapolis, Douglas B. Anderson, midwestern representative of Americans for Democratic Action, told a state ADA gathering that Eisenhower "will accept a draft nomination if President Truman withdraws."

Smith Has Word  
Gerald L. K. Smith, Christian Nationalist crusade leader, said in Tulsa, Okla., that he has information the general "will definitely be available if drafted for the nomination on the first ballot."

The former America-Firster said he's against Ike because he's "more of an internationalist than President Truman."

Assistance Bill Survives Talks

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A bill to provide \$6,000,000 of federal funds for the assistance of local schools where enrollments were swollen by the war and national defense programs was passed after one of the bitterest debates during the closing hours of Congress.

The measure was attacked by Senators Taft (R-Ohio) and Ball (R-Minn.) as a needless federal expense that should be borne by local communities.

"About three fourths of this assistance," Ball said, "goes to three states—Oregon, Washington, and Texas, all three of which have received hundreds of millions of dollars of federal contracts. Then they have the gall to come to Congress and ask for federal assistance to carry on the local function of education."

Then, police reported, the man asked the boys if they could use \$10 apiece. The lads said sure.

"Okay," said the stranger, "we'll play hide and seek. I'll hide the \$10 bills and if you kids can find them you can keep them. Now go into the bathroom and close your eyes."

The boys did and upon the signal from the stranger they began the search. While they were looking "Mr. Robbins" departed.

Later, Howard's parent returned. Mrs. Weinberg reported a \$10,000 platinum and diamond bracelet and a \$7500 diamond ring missing from a jewel box.

## Aid Program Becomes Law

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The \$6,000,000 foreign aid program became law Monday.

President Truman signed the appropriation bill swinging America full force into the most ambitious world economic program in history.

It pledges to western Europe and far eastern countries to spend within 15 months—within a year if necessary—this vast sum in the cause of recovery and political freedom.

Authorities of the bill also made it clear the intent also is to throw up a barrier against the spread of Communism by strengthening governments outside of the iron curtain.

In a statement the President said the appropriation represents "the combined judgment and will of the executive and the Congress."

"It was evolved in the spirit of cooperation and not of partisan conflict," Mr. Truman continued.

It demonstrates the united determination of our people to make good our pledge of cooperation to those who, like ourselves, are striving to achieve enduring peace and prosperity among all nations."

(1) \$4,000,000 for the Economic Cooperation Administration (ECA) to help 16 western European nations. The money is in addition to \$1,055,000,000 already given ECA by Congress. The program is spread over 15 months, but the President may authorize the money to be spent in 12 months if he believes it is necessary.

(2) \$400,000,000 for aid to China. ECA will direct the recovery part of the China program. But \$125,000,000 of the funds will be spent in 12 months if he believes it is necessary.

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
