Sergeant Walls was killed in action October 31, 1944 in the Seventh Army Sector in Eastern France. He was assigned to Co. I of 141 Infantry Regiment, and received the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in combat on the French front and was also awarded the Purple Heart, and a personal commendation from his division commander while in Italy.

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## Big Blimp Due Here Tuesday

One of the big "silver cigars" that the kids love to watch, and that are still a novelty in Eugene, will be back Tuesday.

The Goodyear blimp "Volunteer," which visited in Eugene last spring, will arrive over Eugene shortly after noon Tuesday, and this year will be moored at the Eugene Airpark instead of Mahlon Sweet Airport as in the past.

Although the blimp will cruise over the town, it will be moored from time to time at the airpark, and the public is welcome to visit.

George Schaefer, local Goodyear dealer, is making arrangements for the blimp's stay. The former U.S. Navy L-17 will leave Eugene for North Bend sometime Wednesday morning.

The blimp is making its second tour of the west coast since resumption of post-war activities. It is presently enrolled in the Naval Reserve, and wears the honorable discharge button awarded for satisfactory service during the war years.

R. H. Hobensack, veteran of more than 13,000 flying hours in airships, is captain of the ship. He held the rank of commander in the Navy during the war.

**\$35,000 Alimony Sought**

A divorce suit seeking \$35,000 alimony, \$200 a month support for the wife, and \$150 a month support for two minor children, was on file in circuit court Monday.

The action was brought by Dorothy J. Whiting against Alfred Frank Whiting, formerly assistant professor of anthropology, University of Oregon. The couple has been married 11 years.

The plaintiff further prays for \$500 in attorney fees, in the complaint that lists the defendant's assets at more than \$75,000. The cause of action is alleged cruelty.

Whiting's assets are alleged to include a trust fund in New England and a retail business in Arizona, as well as personal property.

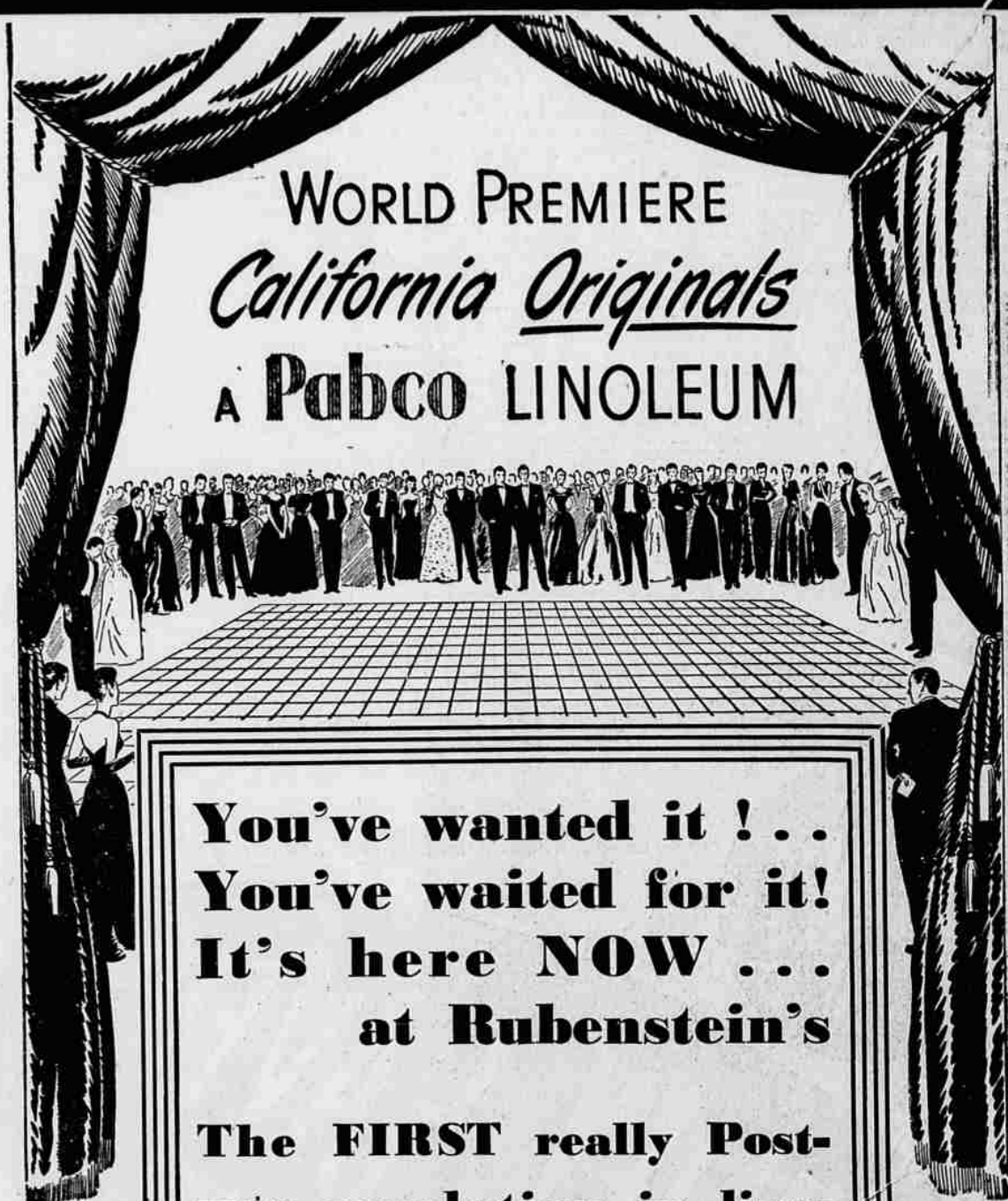
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
