

Cost-of-Living Still Going Up, Meat Prices at All-Time Peak

The cost of living, which reached an all-time high in May, is climbing, a survey showed today.
Meat prices are at an all-time peak, and meat industry spokesmen said there is no hope of a break until September at earliest.
On the brighter side, fresh vegetable prices in many areas declined recently because of seasonal shipment of vegetables to market.
However, the Bureau of Labor Statistics at Washington predicted a longer-range seasonal price rise would bring a slow, steady increase in most food prices until winter.
Rising meat prices also noted that rent is rising.
The increases have been anticipated on several basic commodities as a result of the wage con-

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Thirty Injured In Bus Wreck

SAN BRUNO, Calif. — (U.P.) — Thirty passengers of a Pacific Greyhound bus were injured early Monday when the bus was struck broadside by another vehicle at San Bruno intersection on Bayshore freeway just north of San Francisco.
One of the passengers, Jack Goldberg, San Francisco, was pinned just behind the driver's seat for almost two hours before he could be cut loose by workmen using acetylene torches.
Attendants at Mills Hospital said Goldberg suffered possible compound fractures of both legs.
The other injured, who included all but two passengers, were taken to South San Francisco hospital. None of their injuries was described as serious.
The bus driver, Norman White, 27, of Salinas, told highway patrolmen his northbound bus was just clearing the intersection when the other vehicle, driven by Jack John Kane, San Bruno, hit the bus broadside.

Izvestia Ridicules London Conference

MOSCOW — (U.P.) — Izvestia, the Soviet government newspaper, said Monday that the recent six-power London conference on Germany was carried on "in secret from other European nations."
The newspaper said the "secrecy" of the London meeting was one of the principal differences between that conference and the one held in Warsaw by eastern European countries.
Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, said the London plan, which calls for the early establishment of "home rule" in Germany, was doomed to failure because it involved the impossible task of turning back "history's clock."

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Angry Negro Kills Three

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — (U.P.) — A routine disturbance call turned into a mass shooting Monday which left one policeman and two Negroes dead, another officer riddled with shotgun slugs and a third Negro critically wounded near the downtown district.
A terrified eye-witness, Rosemary Christwell, said she saw Erskine Stephenson, 65, Negro, shoot Patrolman Floyd Montgomery to death, and blast Emile Jones, Negro, and Patrolman Paul Warrington with shotgun slugs from the porch of a midtown apartment.
Hughes and his wife, Lorraine, 27, were found shot to death inside the building. Hughes had been shot through the head, apparently by a pistol, while his wife had been felled by a shotgun.
The witness, sister of the injured Emile Jones, said she turned her back after the patrolmen fell, but heard additional shots.
Jones, his sister said, had called the police after Stephenson had "called us names."

Funeral Ship Crain Arrives from Manila

OAKLAND, Cal. — (U.P.) — The funeral ship Sgt. Morris Crain arrived from Manila Monday with the remains of 1,941 Americans who died in the war.
Most of the bodies originally were buried in New Guinea and the Philippines.

The theory that the victim found in the river last Tuesday might be Arthur Ned Leonard of Portland blew up when Leonard turned up alive and safe in Burns, Ore.
Three brothers of Leonard, who left his Portland residence May 7, were here to examine the body when Leonard telephoned that he was living in Burns.

What and When For Home Freezing
Lyons Weekly News Service
EUGENE, ORE. June 28 — Food prices are definitely out of hand and for those of you who must buy day by day to feed your families all we can say is: "We are sorry." But to those of you who are lucky enough to have freezing facilities, we're publishing weekly, in conjunction with the Public Market, the proper varieties of food for freezing, and when you can glom onto them at their lowest price.

Strawberries Are Good and Cheap
This week you can get a whole crate, twenty-four boxes, for \$5.50. The best varieties for freezing are, in order of preference, Corvallis, Marshall, Brightmore, Dorsett, Fairfax and Premier. Slicing is recommended for freezing, but whole berries may be packed if desired. After placing the berries in the packing box, sugar or simple syrup should be added to taste. Raspberries will be on the market in another week, but the price will probably not be satisfactory for freezing for another two or three weeks.

Asparagus Tomorrow and Wednesday
If you crave asparagus next winter, better get some within the next couple of days. With the fast approaching warm weather, asparagus declines in quality, in fact it goes to seed. Public Market offers you two bunches for 29c which sounds more like pre-war prices than inflation. Asparagus should be cut in 1 inch pieces, blanched from 2 to 3 minutes, cooled quickly and packed.

Rhubarb is at its Peak
The best varieties for freezing are Ruby, Victoria, McDonald Crimson. We recommend cutting the rhubarb in 1 inch pieces. The rhubarb may be covered with syrup or left dry for use in pies later. You may get 4 lbs. for 29c at the Public Market. That should be enough to make some mighty fine pies this winter.

Mid-Summer for Meat
You can look forward to the falling price of meat as soon as warm weather appears, and stays consistently warm. Meat will then be less in demand and prices will be lower. Luncheon meat and bacon will, of course, remain fairly stable in price. Monday of next week we should be able to tell you when apricots, cherries, loganberries, gooseberries, and all the summer fruits we automatically crave in the winter, will be right for freezing.

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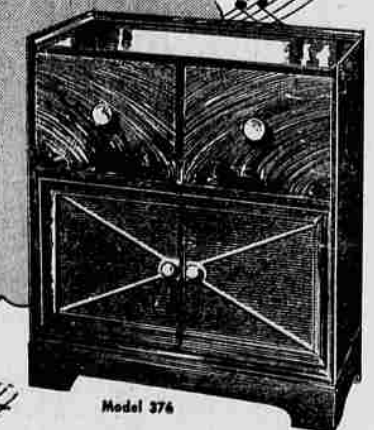
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
