

New Rural Route For Grove Area

COTTAGE GROVE—N. J. Nelson, postmaster announced yesterday that the post office department had authorized the establishment of a new rural route, on July 1st. The new route will relieve the Diston route of approximately half of its patrons.

All patrons residing west of the Dorena post office with exception of patrons living on east Main street over Knox hill and those living on Harvey road will be served by the new route known as RFD No. 1.

Beginning July 1st, the new route will also give new service to patrons living on north highway 99 between Saginaw and Walker. Also to patrons living on Bennett Creek road and the steel bridge on North highway 99.

The other route will be known as City Mounted route. This route can not be started until street signs and house numbers are in place and suitable mail boxes have been provided, which Postmaster Nelson hopes will be arranged by July 15th. The new mounted route will travel east over Knox hill to the Richfield oil plant thence east west to Harvey road at 18th street, then serve Harvey road to North Douglas and North Douglas to North Lane to the Pacific highway 99 and the Grove Hotel, thence south on the highway to North River road beginning at the bridge by the Cottage Grove golf course and south on South River road to Pacific highway 99 to the Sweet Lane (Known as airport road) thence west on Sweet Lane past the Northwest court and retrace to the Pacific highway to South 4th, then Taylor and 6th streets, thence to Lincoln and 11th streets. (Known as Parks Nokes addition), thence back on Harlow road to 6th street and north to Taylor and South 10th (near high school) north on south 10th to Tyler to 13th street (Known as Glass road) thence north on 13th to East Quincy street, thence west to 10th, north to East Madison, west to 17th St., west to 16th street, thence north on 16th street to east Main street, then back to post office.

Reforms in Marking
Nelson said the members on the city planning commission had expressed a desire to work with the postmaster in marking streets and in numbering houses and the city engineer has offered to aid in any way possible in order to expedite delivery of mail to patrons.

A mounted city route delivers your mail the same as a city post carrier, except that you will have curb service in a regulation mail box instead of being delivered to your door and will get one delivery a day.

All patrons will be notified as to the proper method of erecting mail boxes. Several merchants have agreed to have plenty of mail boxes available within 10 days. Should further information be desired, please call the post office, 280.

There will be no changes either in the Blackbutte or Lorane routes, now serving the patrons west and south of town.

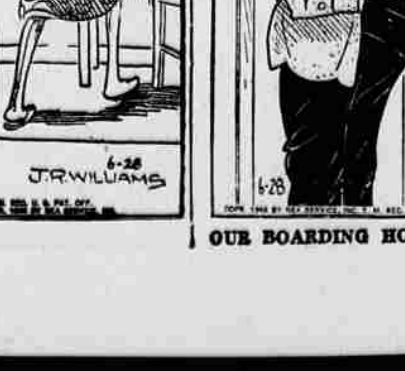
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
