equipment along the alley would be adequate protection of the public interest in the future.

The Water Board suggested that a better policy than vacation would be to give the church a permit to use the alley for its intended purpose of erecting a new chapel.

This view was favored in the final voting by Councilman Calvin Crumbaker, but the other five councilmen present voted for the vacation and the easement.

The other significant actions taken by the council at this meeting included the adoption of a public safety committee report recommending the purchase of the city's new aerial ladder fire truck from the Howard Cooper Corp.

Although this firm entered a bid

\$208 higher than that of the American La France Corp., the committee reported that investigation of the equipment offered had resulted in its report favoring the Cooper bid of \$33,448.

The council also acted upon a report from the city manager to give approval to a one-year fire protection contract for the Glenwood Water District, provided that the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau also approves the plan.

The contract would grant the Glenwood district a second demand on the services of the Eugene Fire Department in return for a fee of approximately \$2000, to be collected by a special four-mill assessment of the property located in the water district.

The city manager's report ex-

plained that the city of Springfield has been forced to discontinue its extension of fire protection to Glenwood and further stated that the city of Eugene intends to provide protection only until the Glenwood community can develop a protection plan of its own.

The Eugene Fire Department will assist in the development of the Glenwood plan if requested to do so.

The council also passed two ordinances recommended by the public safety committee to outlaw the sale or use of air rifles in the city and to give the police department powers to make vagrancy arrests. Both ordinances, carrying emergency clauses, become effective immediately.

At Monday's meeting, the council also heard a letter from the Lane County Milk Distributors' Assn. requesting another review of the butterfat tax adopted April 27 to help meet increased costs of the city milk inspection program.

The letter advised the council that the distributors intend to pay the tax due from them for their May operations, but added that payment will be made under protest.

The butterfat tax, applying to all milk handled in the local bottle and can trade, is charged at the rate of one-half cent per pound of butterfat.

The distributors' letter suggested that a more satisfactory method of financing the inspection program can be found, and in recognition of this suggestion, the council referred the matter to its health committee.

This committee, and the city health board, reviewed the tax plan earlier this month and recommended that it be continued without change.

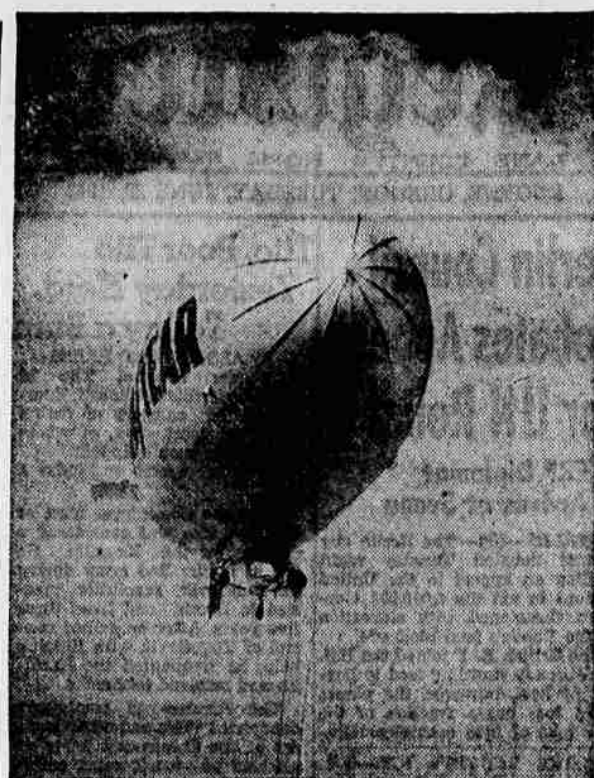
Amazon Needs

Another alarm was answered at 7:42 p.m. when the Arkley Lumber Co. reported that a sawdust conveyor's motor had overheated. Firemen reported damage from this blaze as negligible.

Manager E. Pitkin said the regular winter crew was being used to barrel the light cherry crop this week, but that a very small seasonal crew would be used next week when canning of cherries is started.

The scenic seven-mile trail led past Rosemary Lakes and Maiden Lake and followed the Skyline Trail for several miles.

On the return trip the hikers left the trail and were led down off the mountain by compasses handled by Bob Lemmon and George Korn.
