

Street, Sidewalk Matters on Agenda

Contracts for three sidewalk projects were let by the city council Monday night. Ordinances were passed providing for the paving of three street sections, for the construction of two new sewer lines and for the improvement of an alley.

C. M. Kemp was awarded the sidewalk contracts on the basis of low bids entered by him in competition with two other bidders. Kemp bid \$785.85 on the sidewalk to run along the east side of Adams St., from Clark to Cheshire.

On the west side of the same section of street, he will build a sidewalk for \$904.51. And, on both the east and west sides of Alder, from 26th to 27th, his bid for sidewalk construction was \$1775.54.

The council also approved a bill assessment for a sidewalk improvement on the west side of Filmore St., between Broadway and Eleventh Ave.

Street Work
The streets ordered improved under ordinances adopted at this meeting are: 21st Ave., from Jefferson to Madison; Emerald from 13th to Franklin Blvd.; Kincaid from 28th to 29th.

The sewers to be constructed are to serve property on the east side of Washington, from 24th to

25th, and on the north side of First Ave., from Polk to the west city limits.

The alley up for paving is between Olive and Charnelton, from 22nd and 23rd.

Other actions of the council included instructing the city attorney to contact the legal department of the city of Portland to offer his services in opposing rate changes asked by the Pacific

Telephone and Telegraph Co.

City Attorney John Pennington was further instructed to represent the council at the Public Utility Commission's hearing on the rate changes July 19 at Salem.

No Parking

In adopting a report from its public safety committee, the council approved the creation of no parking signs on the north side of Nineteenth, between Lincoln

and Washington, on the west side of Washington, between Nineteenth and 21st, and on the south side of Twentieth Ave., between Willamette and Oak Sts.

The report also recommended the establishment of bus zones at Eleventh and Olive and Charnelton for east and west bound buses traveling on Eleventh.

Mill Request

A request from the Eugene Planning Mill for approval to construct a blower pipe and steam line across Third Ave. was referred to the street committee for study.

The council also acted to approve the exchange of \$28,000 in U. S. Treasury bonds for a new series paying one and one-eighth per cent interest in place of seven-eighths now being collected on the bonds held by the city.

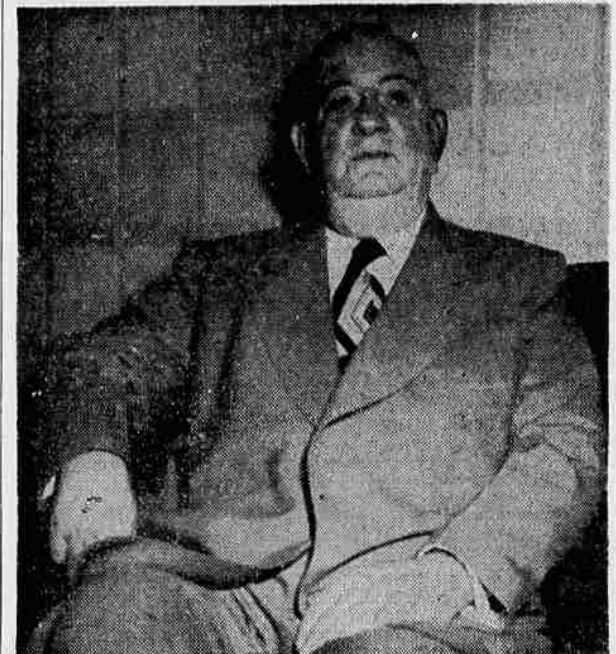
A communication from residents in the neighborhood of Sixteenth and High was read to the council by the city manager protesting the number of traffic accidents at this intersection and urging the erection of stop signs.

As its last order of business, the council authorized the city manager to proceed with negotiations to obtain sites for the city's two new fire department substations.

School Board Discusses Plans for New City High

Members of the District 4 School Board Monday discussed terms of a contract presented to them by Architect Graham Smith for the preparation of plans on the proposed \$1,500,000 high school which the board hopes to build south of Nineteenth Ave., between the lines of High and Ferry Sts.

Smith was elected to design the high school by a vote of the 1944 school board. The contract he presented Monday night provided that he receive a fee of 5 per cent of the building cost for his services.

After a point-by-point discussion of the contract, Smith agreed to present a new draft, incorporating certain suggestions of the board, by Wednesday of this week. This copy will be studied by the board's legal adviser for presentation of an opinion at the July 12 board meeting.

Smith told the school board that he could finish plans on the new school within a year. He added, however, that it would be 90 days before he could get started, making a total of 15 months after the contract signing before actual construction could begin.

For 1500 Students

The structure is to be planned for a maximum of 1500 students at a cost somewhere between \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000.

As soon as an architect's contract is signed, Superintendent Clarence Hines will hire an engi-

neer to prepare a survey of the school site for the architect.

Hines also has indicated that the board will then open discussion of plans for financing the building needs of the entire school system.

Fund Need

A document, distributed to the board Monday, estimated that the district will need \$3,262,000 to meet its building needs through 1953.

With \$500,000 on hand as the result of a special levy for the new high school, the district still will need to raise \$2,762,000 by 1953 through bonds or tax levies.

Estimate Costs
Members of the school system's administrative staff have compiled estimated costs on a bond issue for 5, 10, 15, and 20 year periods, showing the rates of interest and the varying assessments that would be needed to retire each type of issue.

All of these plans will be submitted to the public at an open meeting sometime in the near future, probably this fall.

Among personnel changes authorized by the board Monday was the election of Russell Tompkins, science instructor, to fill the vacant vice-principal's post at Colin

Kelly Junior High School created by the appointment of Charles D. Schmidt as principal of the Pendleton Senior High School.

Schmidt served three years in the vice-principal's post at Colin Kelly.

Interest Rise

In a communication from the First National and U. S. National Banks of Portland, the school board was informed that interest rates on warranty loans granted to the board after the end of the fiscal year will be raised from the current rate of two percent to two and one-half percent.

In other business board members voted to pay off the final \$3400 on Colin Kelly school by retiring in U. S. Treasury notes deposited with the First National Bank to the district's credit. The balance of \$2400 is to be placed in the district's warranty fund.

The board granted a request in a letter from Dick Strite written on behalf of the Cascade Baseball League in which Strite asked that rental paid to the board for the use of civic stadium in an exhibition game between the Cascade League All-Stars and the Harlem Globetrotters, be refunded.

City Parking Ban Forthcoming On Parts of Three Thoroughfares

The Eugene City Council Monday night initiated action to prohibit parking on sections of Alder, Hilyard and Patterson Sts. where narrow paving widths have created serious traffic problems.

The areas to which the ordinance will apply if finally adopted:

Alder—between East Broadway

and Eleventh Ave. E., and between Thirteenth Ave. E. and Nineteenth Ave. E.

Hilyard—between East Broadway and Eleventh Ave. E.

Patterson—between East Broadway and Eleventh Ave. E.

Pioneer Picnic Set on July 10

Wheeler, who is known as "Young Allen" to his pioneer friends, is general chairman of the event, but he admitted Wednesday, "Shucks, I haven't lived here even 50 years, yet."

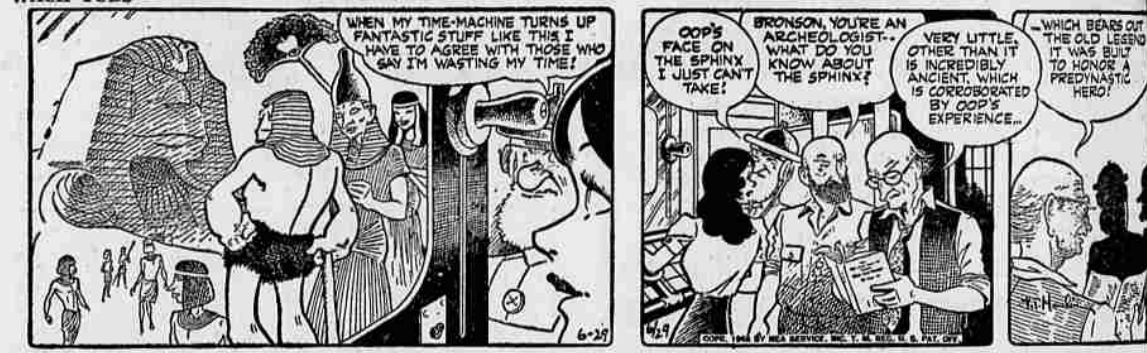
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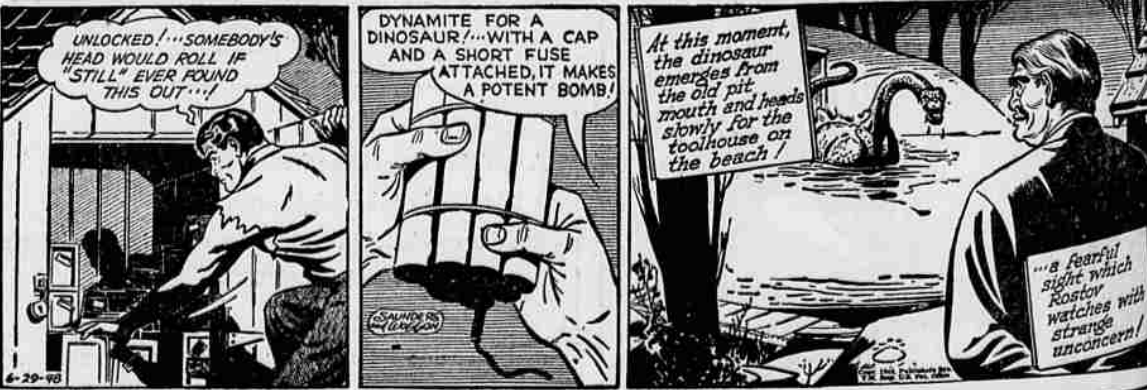
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
