

Bob Lemon Hurls 2-0 No-Hit Win Over Detroit

Tribe Pitcher Gets First One

Bob Lemon's no run-no hit masterpiece Wednesday night made a successful prophet of Cleveland owner Bill Veeck.

The 27-year-old Indian right-hander, who tried his hand at pitching after failing to make the big league grade as an infielder or outfielder, rewarded his boss' faith by shutting out the Detroit Tigers, 2-0, without allowing a single strike.

The victory, Lemon's 11th of the season and his fifth shutout, did more than increase the Tribe's first place American League margin over the Philadelphia Athletics to a game and a half. It further solidified his position as the mainstay of the Indians' staff, which includes the great Bob Feller.

Other Good Games

It was in September 1946 that Veeck told this writer that Lemon "some day will become the best pitcher in the American League."

That was tremendous praise for a lad who had yet to pitch his first complete game in organized baseball, let alone a major.

Although Wednesday's effort was by far his best, Lemon has turned in other brilliant performances this season. He has permitted only four hits in each of his four previous shutouts. He has pitched 12 complete games, the most of any pitcher, and struck out 11 and 10 men in two previous games.

Only on two occasions was his no-hitter threatened. The first scare came in the fourth inning when Leftfielder Dale Mitchell made an amazing one-handed leaping catch of George Kell's long drive that looked like a certain extra base hit. The other came in the fifth when Ken Keltner went deep behind third base to nip Hoot Evers on a slow hopper.

Both Cleveland runs came in the first and were unearned.

Only three Detroit runners reached base, all on walks. It was the first major-league no-hitter of the '48 season.

Jack Kramer posted his seventh win in pitching the Boston Red Sox to a 7-3 triumph over the New York Yankees. Junior Stephens drove in five runs with two hits, including his 14th homer. Ted Williams got a single in five times at bat to extend his consecutive hitting streak through 16 games.

Leonard Hurt

At St. Louis, the Browns nipped the Chicago White Sox 2-1. A home run by Paul Lehner spelled the difference.

The Boston Braves moved a game and a half ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals in the National League race by downing the New York Giants, 3-1, as the Cardinals were whipped again by the Chicago Cubs, 9-1. Bill Voiselle, ex-Giant, held his former mates to seven hits.

Pounding four Brooklyn pitchers for 12 hits and getting 12 walks, the Philadelphia Phillies walloped the Dodgers 13-4, at Ebbets Field. The victory cost the Phillies the services of Pitcher Dutch Leonard who was struck on the head by a pitcher ball by Harry Taylor and was carried from the field. X-rays disclosed no fracture.

The scheduled game between the Senators and Athletics was postponed by rain. Pittsburgh and Cincinnati were not scheduled.

We select Bubalo alone because there is no other firstbaseman who can touch him in hitting, and he is a good, if not the best defensive firstbaseman. Secondbaseman Jack Fassett and Shortstop Gene Tansell and Wally Flager are selected more on their defensive strength than their hitting, and Barney Koch at third is like Bubalo at first.

Charley Mickelson is far and away the best rightfielder in the league and the other gardeners are potent at the plate. Dick Bishop has hit the ball well, but in the wrong places, and his selection is made because of his experience. Eddie Adams is a little weak on hustle at times, but at 429 and 8 RBIs he can't be ignored. Grover Kelsay, even without his .500 batting, would gain a berth for hustle and spirit alone.

The six pitchers named would certainly give any manager plenty to select from.

As for travel—Bubalo, Tansell, Adams and Bill Carney would have to come from Portland, and Fassett and Flager from Salem.

The fans will have a fine time with this, pointing out that we failed to select Shortstop Renny Smith, batting .417, and Don Kirsch, batting .375; Ed Dowdy, playing great defensive ball at third, and Ted Wilson, a dangerous-hitting and fine fielding center fielder. There are others, too, who have no doubt been overlooked, like Johnny Koverz, 1947 league batting champion, in the outfield.

Remember Yacqui Joe, the great Indian wrestler? His colorful manager, John McIntosh, the Little Scotsman who had to act as interpreter for Joe when he first came here years ago, is vacationing in Eugene. . . PALO ALTO, Calif., July 1—(AP)—Michigan's defending champion, Dave Barclay and an imposing array of challengers Thursday began the second round of the National Collegiate golf tournament at Stanford University.

What shaped up as the feature match Thursday morning brought together California Amateur Champion Bob Gardner of the University of California at Los Angeles and Lou Stafford of Oregon. Falkenburg, Aussie Gain Net Finals

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 1—(AP)—Doris Hart of Miami, Fla., gained the women's singles finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships Thursday by upsetting top-seeded Margaret Osborne Du Pont of Bellevue, Del., the defending champion, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

LONDON, July 1—(AP)—Bob Falkenburg of Hollywood, Calif., and Jack Bromwich of Australia stumbled into the finals of the men's championships at Wimbledon Wednesday.

Falkenburg took just one hour and 15 minutes to polish off Gardner Mulloy of Miami, Fla., 6-4, 6-4, 8-6. The Florida veteran not only was sadly off his game but he had no luck, which made it worse.

Bromwich, on the other hand, ate up two hours and 10 minutes in disposing of Josef Asboth, a Hungarian, in an interminable baseline duel which saw only one service ace struck. The score was 6-3, 14-12, 6-2, and the second set alone needed 80 chilled minutes to complete.

Henry Cotton Sets Course Golf Mark

MURFIELD, Scotland, July 1—(AP)—Veteran Henry Cotton, twice winner of the championship, broke the course record with a sensational 66 Thursday as he took the lead in the second round of the British Open golf tournament with a 137.

Cotton's 33-33, two under par, put the British star five strokes ahead of the field with all returns not yet in, and stole the show from both King George's presence and the sparkling comeback of the nine American entries.

But the American surge did not go completely unnoticed. Frank Stranahan, the Toledo, O., winner of the British Amateur title last month, turned in the most dramatic performance of the Yanks when he shot a five-over par 39 on the first nine and then came back with a two-under 32 on the back nine.

That gave him a 71 and a 148 for the two rounds, probably good enough to qualify for the field of 40 which will play the 36-hole final Friday. Stranahan shot a disappointing 77 Wednesday.

Arthur Clark of Huntington, W. Va., shot a 71 for a 145 total. Johnny Bulla of Phoenix, Ariz., and Capt. Edwin Kingsley carded 146's for the 36-holes. Bulla with a 72 Thursday and Kingsley with an impressive 69.
