

Calif. Votes Unpromised

LOS ANGELES — President Truman may lose a majority of California's 54 votes on the first ballot at the Democratic convention next month, the United Press learned Wednesday.

An influential leader of the state delegation revealed that what he described as "a majority" of the group does not consider itself legally bound to vote for Truman, even though every delegate signed a pledge to support him.

The informant, who would not allow his name to be used, said the undecided delegates will make up their minds whom to vote for after they get to Philadelphia.

One delegate placed the number of dissidents as high as 28. State Democratic Chairman James Roosevelt, eldest son of the late president, is a vehement critic of some phases of the Truman administration and is known to lean toward Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as a presidential choice.

Vacillations of Hitler's Foreign Policy Disclosed in Documents

WASHINGTON — The State Department is ready to explode the notion that Adolf Hitler's diplomatic corps was a streamlined machine that knew where it was going.

The department will publish within a few months two volumes of captured documents from the German foreign office. These books, first of about 25 volumes to be published in the next several years, will shed new light on the diplomatic negotiations that launched Hitler's drive for world conquest.

Historical experts who have seen the documents said their greatest surprise was to learn how many different ideas Hitler's diplomatic lieutenants and foreign agents had about Der Fuehrer's day-to-day objectives.

The volumes will show, one expert said, that there was not one German foreign policy, but a dozen different policies.

"Hitler would pat each of his foreign agents on the back and let him think he was pushing THE correct policy," he said. "Finally Hitler would decide on one policy."

Those who had espoused the other policies would find themselves out of step, completely reversed by Hitler's order.

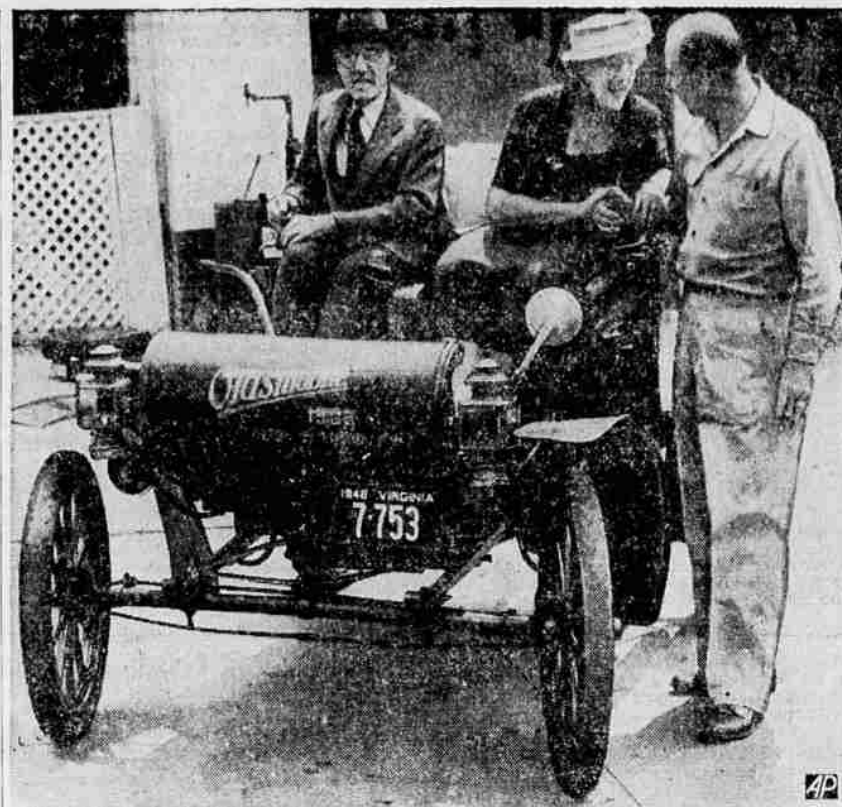
Many of them, he said, paid dearly for failure to outguess the Fuehrer. They were banished in disgrace from high positions. Except for the spectacular purges of 1934 and 1938, the 'outside world' had little knowledge of this thread of confusion that wound itself up and down the Nazi diplomatic front.

"It was a very risky business — serving as a foreign diplomat or agent for Hitler," the expert said.

The variety of policies was most pronounced in Australia, the expert said. In the case of Czechoslovakia, Hitler did lay down a firm policy right from the start. Even so, it was not an easy one for his diplomats to carry out.

The documents will show that just prior to Nazi annexation of the Sudetenland, Hitler told his negotiators:

"You are to make demands which always are just high enough so the Czechs cannot grant them and just low enough so they cannot break off negotiations."

Physicians Needed For Veteran Service

More than a score of doctors are needed for positions in Veterans Administration hospitals and regional offices in the Pacific Northwest, according to Kenneth L. Farmer, VA representative in this area.

The vacancies have been created by the release of Army and Navy physicians "loaned" to the VA the last two years.

Most seriously needed are general physicians, specialists in chest diseases, specialists in anesthesiology and psychiatrists.

Pay for doctors in the VA's department of medicine and surgery ranges from \$4149 to \$11,000 a year, depending on qualifications.

Farmer advised doctors interested in VA positions to write or visit the nearest Veterans' hospital or the Director, VA Branch No. 11 Medical Service, Exchange Building, Seattle 4, Wash.

14 Feared Dead in Boat Fire

CEDAR KEYS, Fla. — Fourteen men and women were feared dead Wednesday, two were known killed and only two survivors could tell of a Sunday morning fishing-boat tragedy.

Coast Guardsmen and volunteers were out at dawn Wednesday in planes and boats, with the slim hope that some others might have lived through three days and three nights of ordeal in the Gulf of Mexico.

Every bit of driftwood, every tiny patch of Sandy Key was given intense scrutiny by searchers. There had been no sign of the party of 18 that set out early Sunday for a fishing trip until Tuesday two survivors and the body of a woman were found.

Tells of Fire

William Sanders, Ocala, Fla., told from a hospital bed of the disaster that came as the party was beginning to fish. Without warning he said, the gas tank exploded and the 38-foot "Hazel" burst into flame from stem to stern. Within 15 minutes the hull had sunk and there were only pieces of wreckage and six life preservers afloat.

L. P. Burnett, owner of the craft, died almost instantly, Sanders said. But the rest of the party "jumped into the water right away and stuck together, holding onto bits of wreckage."

"We floated all day and all night. All Monday and Monday night. We kept together, shouting encouragement to each other until we were too hoarse under that sun. We were still together Tuesday morning."

"We could see an island in the distance and some of the others started to swim for it. That was the last we saw of them. Then some of us started getting hysterical and gave up. They sank."

Sharks — Nibble

Big fish, presumably sharks, approached close to them and even nibbled at the life preservers and wreckage, Sanders said. The women had been given the preservers while the men grabbed what they could.

Sanders and Mrs. William Potts, wife of a truck driver, were found alive but badly burned by flames and sun on a small key off the coast. A fishing guide later came across the body of Mrs. Ted Hill floating near the same spot. All members of the party were from Ocala.

Shoes Not Sanitary, Foot Expert Says

OKLAHOMA — "The shoe is the most unsanitary article of body covering in existence," according to Dr. Felton O. Gamble, foot expert.

"There is heat, darkness and moisture — the same conditions that produce mold on cheese or bread," Gamble told a meeting of the Southwestern Chiropractic Congress here.

That is why so many persons have athlete's foot, he said.

"A fastidious woman who never will wear other clothing more than a day will wear her shoes six months and keep them stored in a dark closet when she's not wearing them," the doctor chided.

"Men are worse because their shoes are almost without ventilation," he added.

To guard against fungus infection, a person should change shoes at least twice a day and expose the unused pair to sunlight, Gamble advised.

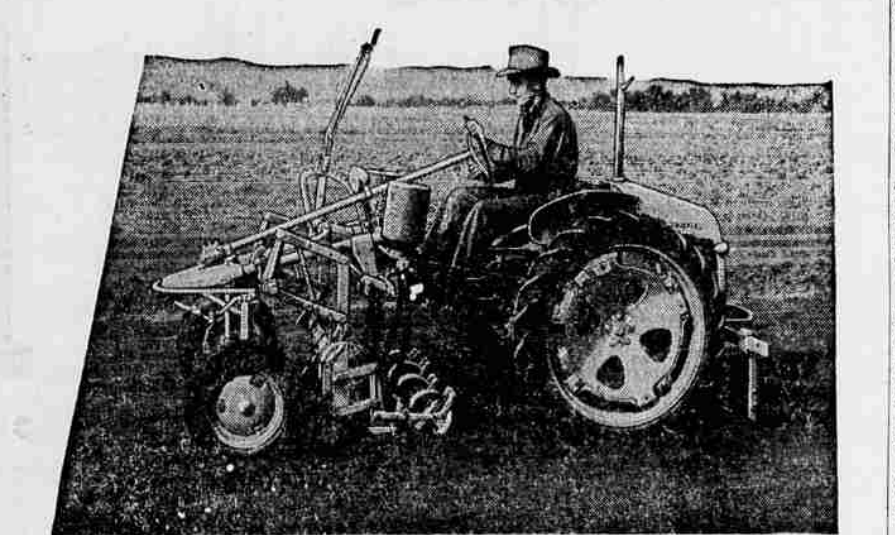
