Harvester Co. Strike Settled

CHICAGO —(AP)—The International Harvester company and the CIO United Farm Equipment Workers settled a lengthy wage dispute Wednesday night, 48 hours after a strike by some 35,000 union members in nine of the company's plants.

The new contract, providing for a wage increase of 11 cents an hour and retention of provisions in the old contract, will be submitted for approval Thursday at the union headquarters in Chicago.

An early return to work was expected. The union described the settlement with the company as "satisfactory." It said records indicated the two-way walkout was the shortest "successful strike this year."
