

Red Cross Strengthens Local Responsibility, Morris Says

Today, when there is a drift of controls toward Washington D. C., people in the nation's communities should watch for opportunities to strengthen work on problems of the local level, as is done in the Red Cross where the basic work, decisions and financing are done on the local level, Dr. Victor P. Morris told persons attending the annual Red Cross meeting Wednesday evening.

The dean of the University of Oregon school of business administration pointed out that hungry, insecure, suffering people are the most fertile ground for leadership that tends toward dictatorship.

Gives Hope

He said the Red Cross gives these individuals a high measure of hope that helps build the bulwarks against the tides that might overflow the nation.

Pointing out that the community often overlooks work being done effectively by any agency and only notes the jobs not being done well, Dr. Morris declared that the Red Cross, which carries its greatest load in time of war, is also a great civilian agency.

Pooling Agency

He described the Red Cross as "one practical agency where the humanitarian efforts of the individual can be pooled with those of others to make the desired contribution."

Dead from Italy Arrive on Tuesday

NEW YORK —AUA—The first American war dead to be returned from Italian battlefields will arrive at the Brooklyn Army base next Tuesday, July 6, aboard the army transport Carroll Victory. The New York port of embarkation announced Thursday.

The bodies of 4,800 men, most of them killed on the Anzio beachhead, left Naples on June 24. All were disinterred from the American military cemetery at Nettuno.

Memorial services will be held at the Army base at 11 a. m. on the day of arrival. Next of kin of all war dead aboard the Carroll Victory will be notified before the ship arrives, the Army said.

Upper McKenzie Geology Trip Set by Obsidians Over Holiday

Obsidians and members of the Geological Society of the Oregon Country, with headquarters in Portland, will jointly sponsor a field trip to the Upper McKenzie over the Fourth of July weekend.

A geological study of the McKenzie and Clear Lake area will be made. Hugh Currin of the Eugene Obsidians, and Dr. Warren D. Smith, local geologist, will serve as leaders.

Portlanders

Twenty-six members of the Portland Society have made reservations for the trip. Obsidians who plan to participate are asked to sign up as usual at Henderson's Sporting Goods store. The group will stay at the Obsidian cabin above Belknap Springs and at the Springs hotel and cabins.

Dr. Smith will give an introductory talk Saturday night. He will go into the geology and history of the region which the group will visit Sunday and Monday. Among the interesting features

to be seen and studied on the North Fork of the McKenzie from Belknap Springs to Clear Lake are:

- (1) the hot springs at Belknap;
- (2) Clear Lake with its submerged forest and large spring on the east bank;
- (3) recent lava flow which dammed the McKenzie about 1000 years ago and produced the lake;
- (4) Pahohoe lava flow in the bottom of the canyon below the lake; and
- (5) three scenic falls, Upper, Middle and Lower.

The lava can be placed in three categories—the older lava of the valley walls, the intra-canyon lavas, and the recent lava flows. These lavas are all basalts.

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
