A few complaints have been received, especially in the Springfield area, about the younger generation exploding the crackers inside the mail boxes.

Kids will be kids (and even the postmasters realize that), but exploding firecrackers can damage the boxes and the letters.

Besides, Uncle Sam has rules and regulations against such tampering with mail which can run up into high dollar figures or several months confinement.

Of course, there is a city ordinance against shooting firecrackers within the city limits, also. Anyway you look at it, kids, they've got you hooked.

Radio Can't Cut Political Talks

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Federal Communications Commission Wednesday ordered into effect a ruling that radio stations must not censor political broadcasts even when they contain seemingly libelous matter.

The action was taken in a final decision granting a renewal of operating license to Station WHLS, Port Huron, Mich.

Not Responsible
The commission also repeated its contention that stations are not responsible under state libel laws for any libelous matter contained in political broadcasts.

The commission's decision carried out a proposed ruling issued in January. In effect it denied petitions by the National Association of Broadcasters and other radio interests who requested a separate hearing on policy rulings in the case.

Opponents of the no-censorship rule contended that stations are caught on the horns of a dilemma. Either the station loses its license if it censors libel or it faces ruinous lawsuits, they said.

Law Absolute

But the commission said the communications act's prohibition against censorship of political broadcasts is absolute and "appears clearly to constitute an occupation of the field by federal authority, which under the law would relieve the licensee of responsibility for any libelous matter broadcast in the course of a speech . . . irrespective of the provision of state law."

Station WHLS had censored some political talks. The commission held this was not "deliberate" and since these principles of law were the subject of much confusion at the time, the license should be renewed.

McLoughlins' Bodies Await Reburial

OREGON CITY—(AP)—The bodies of Dr. and Mrs. John McLoughlin, early Oregon pioneers and founders of Oregon City, were awaiting reburial here Friday.

They were exhumed after 88 years beneath St. John's Catholic Church after sale of the church property.

Complete plans for reburial were not announced but tentative steps were afoot for a temporary interment in property of the new church site with removal to a place under the baptistry of the new church when it is erected.

He has been professor of political science at the University of Wyoming for the past year.

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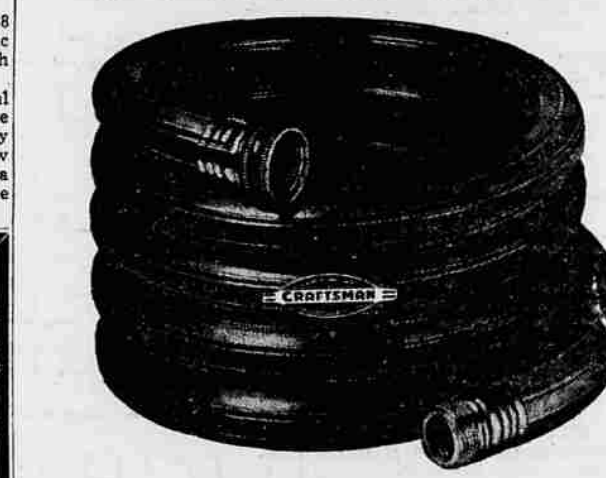

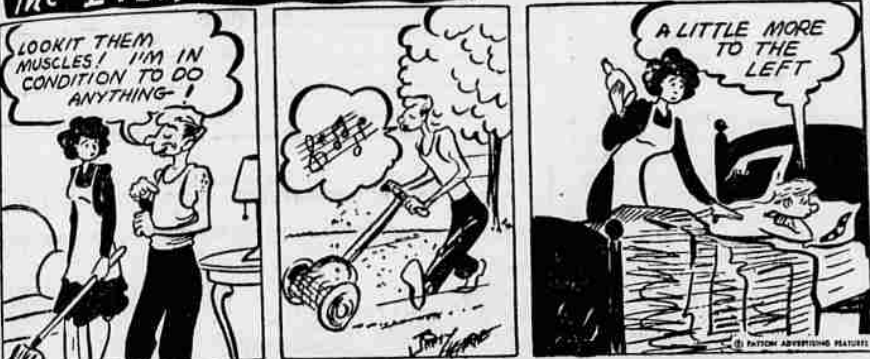
