

Bachelor Bull Prince Rupert To Undergo Pituitary Operation

AMES, Ia.—(AP)—Prince Rupert, a six-year-old Hereford bull with no offspring to comfort his sun-
set years, munched nervously on a meal of corn and alfalfa Friday, awaiting an operation that may make history.
Gov. Roy Turner Oklahoma owns Prince Rupert, who sold in 1943 for \$38,000, the highest price paid for a bull up to that time.
No Father, He
The prince turned out to be a royal dud. The pituitary gland at the base of his brain failed to develop normally. That meant that Prince Rupert couldn't become a daddy.
At six, a bull—especially a \$38,000 bull—should have a herd of grandchildren. Prince Rupert is just a 1500-pound bachelor.
Pituitary Graft
That may change now. For next Wednesday Dr. M. A. Emerson of the Iowa State College veterinary staff will graft an extra pituitary into Prince Rupert's neck. He hopes to make the prince a potential father.
The pituitary will be taken from a bull named Silver Lelston, which has a long list of offspring. Reducing Diet
Turner was about ready to convert Prince Rupert into sausage when Wayne Fox, a Des Moines feed-store manager, persuaded the Oklahoma governor to let him see if a reducing diet would help the prince. The prince lost about 400 pounds, but it didn't help. He was shipped to Ames, where the pituitary experiment was decided upon.
Silver Lelston's pituitary will be removed in Des Moines, placed in a chilled solution and rushed to Ames where Emerson will perform the operation on Prince Rupert. Emerson believes it will be the first such operation in Hereford history.
Take Awhile
It may be several months, Emerson says, before Prince Rupert knows the results.
As for Silver Lelston, he'll never know, for he must be slaughtered before his pituitary can be taken. Greater love hath no bull.

Mark Twain Laughed Loudly At Virginia City's News Editor

VIRGINIA CITY, Nev.—(AP)—The ghost of Mark Twain laughed loud and long through the saloons of historic Virginia City this week.
Every so often in the days when Mark was editor of the Territorial Enterprise here, he gave in to a terrible temptation and wrote a fantastic tale about the death of some widely-known Comstock figure. When the would-be dead man and his friends read the news, naturally everything went into a state of wild confusion. And just as naturally, Mark would leave town until the hubbub died.

Man Walks In
This week, something happened in the office of Pete Burke, editor of the Virginia City News—heir to Mark Twain's Territorial Enterprise.

One Duncan Emrich walked in, introduced himself to Burke as an old-time resident of Virginia City. Emrich said he had just witnessed the death of "Bronco" Lazzari, a beloved Comstock saloon keeper. Emrich asked permission to write the account for the news, and Burke trustingly allowed him to do so.

And so, a long, philosophical, and heart-rending account of the death of "Bronco" Lazzari appeared in the paper. "Bronco," according to the article, died a horrible death when a great mounted deer head with silver-tipped horns fell from the wall and ran him through and through.

And so, the relatives and friends of "Bronco" trooped to Virginia City this week to pay their final respects to a dear friend. Imagine their consternation when "Bronco" arose from his "death bed" and wanted to know "what the... was the matter."

Amidst all the confusion, Editor Burke says he can't locate the mysterious gentleman who dropped in.

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Eye Doctors Face Charges

CHICAGO—(AP)—Hundreds of eye doctors from every state in the union were named as defendants in a federal anti-trust suit, filed nearly two years ago against optical goods wholesalers and oculists.

It was the second major addition to the list of 52 oculists named in the original suits filed July 23, 1946. More than 2700 eye doctors were named in the first addition approved last Feb. 26.

The optical companies named in the suits included Bausch & Lomb, the American Optical, Riggs Optical and several others.

The government charges that the companies sought to fix the price of eye glasses by giving rebates to eye doctors.
