Politicking Ain't What It Used To Be

The life of a politician must have its bright spots, or politics would not be so attractive to men and women who have easier ways of earning livings and finding entertainment. It also has its tribulations, to which science is contributing.

Once upon a time politics was simple. The candidate and the parties' orators could each prepare a single speech, as a barnstorming club lecturer does, and travel all over the country repeating it from memory.

Fast, complete newspaper coverage made that unwise, though friendly reporters could help by selecting one section a day to write up. The radio, however, made it impossible. With everybody listening in — the candidate hopes — he cannot go around repeating himself word-for-word.

Radio also demanded a change in elocutionary approach. No more bellowing, arm waving, striding around the platform, hypnotizing the audience with gymnastics. The orator must modulate both voice and gestures to keep near the mike and not blow it out. Often, too, he must decide whether to play for those in the hall or those on the air.

These thoughts are suggested by the GOP convention just passed, the Democratic convention coming up, the bitter campaign in which Thomas Dewey will try to break Harry Truman's lease on the White House. They are suggested also by the debut at Philadelphia of big-time television.

The Republican politicians were the goats. They were victims of television's understandable and excusable uncertainty how to go about covering its first convention. They were victims also of their own ignorance that the candidate must don grease paint if he wants to look good to the boys and girls on high stools in the nation's taverns.

Conventions always have been carnivals. As television comes in the lid will go clear off. Elephants—rubber and live—are old stuff. Bunting, buttons, ties with candidates' pictures, Indians in full tribal dress are trite. That's the sort of thing that can't stand still.

Dewey's fashion parade, Stassen's Hawaiian ukulele singers were good enough for a start. The model who stole the Dewey show by coyly raising her skirts to display garters with pink elephants must have swayed less votes — though Stassen did lose — than did Virginia Davis, daughter of the band leader, when she raised her skirt to show the picture of her Minnesota hero high on her thigh.

If this keeps up, television ought to be fun. It can bring other pleasures, too. Former Gov. Alf Landon suggested one. Political speeches, he says, used to run for two or three hours. The demands of radio cut them down by about two-thirds. He thinks, and

U. S. Aims at Tangier-Type Government for Palestine

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Gradually the Truman administration policy on Palestine is beginning to emerge and make a little more sense. For a time, trying to follow that policy was a little bit like wandering with Moses through the Wilderness of Mt. Sinai. It took 40 years to get the Chosen People out of that one.

The United Nations has had the Palestine problem before it only one year. Whether it will take another 39 years remains to be seen. But the basic policy of the United States is to have the United Nations find the solution and make it work.

So far, this has turned into something of a duck-passing game. The UN Security Council and General Assembly are inclined to let the United States take the lead. Nobody else has come up with any bright ideas at all. And the United States wants good constructive suggestions from others.

President Truman, Secretary of State Marshall and Ambassador to the United Nations Warren Austin all say that the United States is still for the United Nations decision to partition Palestine — eventually. But it can't be done until the Arabs and the Jews stop fighting. So until they do stop fighting, the United States has proposed setting up a temporary trusteeship.

A month ago, President Truman was asked at a press conference whether the United States would send troops to Palestine if the United Nations decided a trusteeship was necessary. The President replied that we — meaning the United States government — would cross that bridge when we came to it.

But Bridge Is Soon Crossed
The bridge was in plain sight when the President pulled this nifty. But there seemed to be some hesitancy about putting foot on the bridge, as though fearing it wouldn't hold.

Now, however, "we" have taken that step. In two recent statements, Ambassador Austin has indicated a willingness to let American troops cross the bridge over to Jordan. It isn't a full-fledged plan. It is described as a working paper. The difference is that whereas a plan is supposed to be pretty complete, a working paper is just a lot of rough ideas which it is hoped can be polished.

Austin's working paper was first presented to members of the Security Council — less Russia and the Ukraine — at an informal meeting in Austin's office on April 7. In 15 points it outlined a provisional government for a temporary UN trusteeship.

In short, the way was being paved for an international police force. The difficulties which this presents are obvious. Russia has blocked creation of any kind of UN police force. If the force is to be one of these three — or four — power occupations such as set up in Germany, Austria or Trieste, it can't be expected to work any better. The U.S., Britain and Russia have been trying to find a governor general for Trieste ever since the Italian peace treaty was signed, and haven't succeeded. Nobody wants a hopeless job of that kind.

Policeman's Lot Is Not A Happy One
Moreover, no country would relish sending its troops to replace the British in Palestine and try to put down civil war. The Russians might, if they could do it alone. If the United States took on the job, it would be accused by the Russians of being imperialistic, trying to get a stranglehold on the Middle East.

But in his statement of April 21 to the General Assembly 58-nation Political Committee, Ambassador Austin amplified on his original paper by saying that the United States would furnish troops, "along with other members who are willing to carry out such a task. . . . The United States . . . is not prepared to act alone in this matter." So here we go, crossing the bridge.

What the administration is apparently seeking by this proposal is a setup similar to the government of Tangier, the international zone in Morocco, opposite Gibraltar.

Since 1912 Morocco has been divided into Spanish and French zones. A neutral Tangier zone — like Jerusalem would be — was set up in 1923. It is governed by an international body controlled by Britain, France, Italy and Spain.

In 1940 Tangier was occupied by Spain. It was under Spanish rule till September, 1945. Then Britain, France, Russia and the United States asked the Spanish to get out. They did. Today there is a Moorish Mendoub, or representative of the Moroccan Sultan as head of government. It is really run by a Frenchman, with a Belgian chief of police, who are locally recruited.

A government like that is wanted for Palestine.

Jesse James Found Alive; Old Foe 'Identifies' Him

SAN LEANDRO, Cal. — (UP) — The man who claims he is Jesse James was recognized as the outlaw Monday by an 85-year-old former train robber.

Al Jennings, 85, now reformed and a well-known Los Angeles resident, walked into a hotel room where a man known as J. Frank Dalton, 101, lay in bed, confined by an old hip injury.

"Do you know me, Jesse?" asked Jennings.
"You're Al Jennings," gasped Jesse. "You beat me in a gun match once."
"That's him—that's the face, so help me God!"

The two men wept and embraced.
"Boys, there ain't a bit of doubt on earth! This here is Jesse James!" Jennings said.

Jennings and James, who said he has lived under the name of Dalton since his supposed death in 1882, were brought here for a Fourth of July celebration. Jennings said he knew Dalton really was Jesse James because he asked the latter some questions about a shooting match that "no body but him and me could have known."

"I was just a kid then, but I was the fastest gun fighter on the range," Jennings said. "Jesse and Frank James came to the ranch and we had a shooting match. I won it. There ain't nobody but me and one other knows that — and he's Jesse James."
James admitted Jennings beat him. He said he always "boosted

my shootin' so's I wouldn't have to shoot."

"I'm just a shell now, Al," said James. "Just a shell of the man that used to be Jesse James."

American Policy: 'Knife in the Back'

AMMAN — (UP) — King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan voiced ardent hope Monday for a change in American policy toward the Arabs, "whose friendship is much more valuable than our enmity."

Abdullah in an interview extended personal greetings to the United States. But he warned that persistence in the American policy regarding Palestine was alienating the friendship of the whole Arab world.

He said his people respected Russia and her frank aggressiveness to what he called the American knife in the back tactics.

"It is better to face an open enemy such as Russia, who admits basing her policy on force and aggression than to face a masked enemy who smiles at you and then puts a knife in your back," he said.

Way to Brew Iced Tea Told

Surveys show that many women brew tea "By guess and by goodness." Yet tea experts point out there is an absolutely foolproof way to brew perfect tea every time — and here it is:

1. Use a china or glass teapot.
2. Use one teaspoonful of tea or one tea bag for each cup served.
3. Pour on fresh, bubbling, briskly boiling water.
4. Allow to stand for five minutes.

For iced tea pour into glasses filled with ice.

You can also make iced tea by the cooling pitcherful — achieve the self-same perfect results! Here's how:

To make eight servings in a pitcher:

1. Put eight teaspoonsful of tea, or eight tea bags, into a teapot, and pour on one pint (two glasses) of fresh boiling water.
2. Allow to stand for five minutes, stir, and strain into a serving pitcher.
3. Dilute with two pints (four full glasses) of cold tap water and let stand at room temperature until ready to serve.
4. Fill glasses with ice, and pour tea from pitcher over the ice.
