Fire Prevention Permits Required

The City Bureau of Fire Prevention issued a final reminder Tuesday to persons required to have licenses for the storing, handling or use of materials constituting a fire risk. Hazardous operations involving inflammable materials are permitted only upon issuance of permits from the bureau, Fire Marshal Lester Barker stated. These permits are issued on a calendar-year basis, Barker added, and those formerly in force should have been renewed before July 1. Cards reminding permit holders of the expiration date were mailed several weeks ago, he said, but as yet more than 70 renewals remain to be made. Unless establishments—such as service stations, dry cleaners, paint stores, etc.—take action to get 1948 permits in reasonable time, penalties provided by city ordinance will be invoked.
