**Pressure Fudge Takes No Beating**

Hold everything! There's a new-fashioned way to make old-fashioned fudge that is quick, cool and effortless. All you need are a few simple ingredients and—here's the surprise!—your pressure cooker.

No beating at all, very little cooking—yet the fudge made this brand-new way is just about the best you've ever tasted.

To make it, get together the following:  
1 can sweetened condensed milk  
2 7-oz. bags chocolate chips  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
2 cups water in cooker with rack

Be sure that the condensed milk is the heavy, sweetened kind, and that the chocolate chips are the little tid-bits you use in making Toll-house cookies.

Place milk and chocolate in a bowl that may be set loosely in your cooker. (Any bowl that is the proper size may be used; the equalized heat of the pressure cooker will not break even glass or china.) Mix Cover bowl with foil wrapping or double thickness of wax paper, securely tied. Place bowl on rack with water in cooker. Place cover on cooker and heat until steam flows from vent-pipe to release all air from cooker. Place indicator weight on vent pipe and cook 5 minutes with stem at COOK position, or 15 pounds pressure. Cool cooker at once, and remove bowl. Stir mixture just until chocolate is evenly blended. Stir in nut meats. Turn into a cool bowl and let stand without beating until fudge is cold. Drop by teaspoonful on wax paper or pour in buttered pan. Cut in squares when firm. It does not require refrigeration to harden.

**Recipes**

**Lamb and Eggplant Casserole (Serves 4)**

One and one-half pounds breast of lamb, 2 tablespoons drippings or olive oil or bacon fat, 1/3 cup chopped onion, 1 small eggplant (about 2 cups, diced), 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1 cup canned tomato pulp, 1/4 cup crumbs.

Bone and trim lamb and brown lean meat in drippings with chopped onion. Pare eggplant; cut in cubes and combine with other ingredients. Place mixture in a greased casserole. Bake, covered, in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 45 minutes. Remove cover, sprinkle with bread crumbs and brown 20 minutes.

The tang and spice of onion, parsley, pickles and French dressing on today's baked fish follows one of the sure-fire rules for making it appetizing.

**Piquant Baked Fish**

1 pound of fish steaks  
Salt and pepper  
1 tablespoon chopped onion  
1 tablespoon chopped pickle  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
2 tablespoons French dressing  
Salt and pepper fish; place on a well-greased sheet. Cook 15 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit). Combine other ingredients and spread over the fish. Continue baking flakes easily when tested with a fork.

**CITRUS FRUITS MAKE SALADS TOO**

Are you one of those home-makers who think orange juice or grapefruit for breakfast is the only way to use tangy citrus fruit?

Better brush up on other uses for these fruits with the sun-drenched sparkle. For they're still economy buys.

Try this enticing salad bowl—straight from a swank hotel: Sections of grapefruit and orange on crisp lettuce are dotted with a few slices of colorful strawberries and circle a sprig of cool green mint—use a boiled dressing mixed with top milk.

Don't overlook this fruit compote: grapefruit sections, sugar-sprinkled, topped with a thick puree of chilled apricot.
