The young couple, both members of very wealthy lumber industry families, will be married in the beautiful gardens of the Gravelly Lake home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Corydon Wagner.

Weyerhaeuser, 22 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., received national attention in May, 1935, when he was kidnaped and ultimately ransom-

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Pressure Cooker Will Make Popcorn

Did you know that you can make easy, effortless pop-corn in your pressure cooker? Just be sure you remove the sealing band

before you start.

To make popcorn, place pressure cooker over medium heat. Add two tablespoons of cooking fat, and just enough corn to cover the bottom of the cooker. Turn heat to low. Put the cooker cover

in place after the sealing band has been removed. It is not necessary to agitate the cooker during the popping process. Do not remove the indicator weight, of any Remove corn from cooker season with salt and melted
