

Police Check Gunfire at Mill

Gunfire was reported for the second successive night in the vicinity of the Arkley Lumber Co., 2101 Sixth Ave. W., after midnight Thursday.

A city patrol car saw a car pass the mill at 2:45 a.m. and heard three shots, two of them after the car lights had been doused but the speed of the vehicle unslowed as it escaped from the scene.

Wednesday at 10:30 p.m. two bullets were fired into the watchman's shack at the mill from a passing car. City police later recovered one of the bullets and the .22 caliber shell from which it was fired.

Wallace Resigns From New Republic

NEW YORK —(AP)— Henry A. Wallace has resigned as contributing editor of the New Republic magazine.

The Third Party presidential candidate said in a final article for the weekly:

"The strenuous three months ahead will require my full energies."

"Moreover," he added, "the New Republic's editors should be completely free to support, without any embarrassment whatsoever, the candidate and party which most appeal to them."

Wallace became contributing editor of the magazine after he resigned its editorship to enter the presidential race.

are available. However, they must meet the "period of remaining service" requirement, which requires variable number of months of obligated service in order to enter the schools. They will be given an equal chance with regular army personnel for promotions.

Exemptions include bona fide divinity students and ministers. By presidential proclamation, medical, scientific and other specialized students can be exempted, as can dependent and hardship cases, and certain essential industrial or agricultural vocations.

Members of organized reserve units, who have had less than 90 days of duty, can be called up for 21 months of active duty. This will not be via the draft, but by presidential proclamation.

Primarily, the inductees will be trained for "fighting" and not for occupational duty. The latter will be a secondary feature of their time in the service.

Guest Houses

Parents will be allowed to visit their sons at the stations during the off hours, as during the war. Guest houses, used extensively in World War II, will be reopened at the camps, with lodging available for a nominal charge.

The army is planning extensive recreational and leisure-hour facilities. Competitive athletics will play an important part in the army life. Inductees will have an equal opportunity to perform with the regular personnel, including participation in the "all-army" championships.

Service clubs on the bases will be the center of the extra-curricular activity, and will be equipped with reading matter, games, etc. Dances will be regularly scheduled as in the past.

Local Cooperation

With the appropriations taxed to the limit, the Army says that it has funds only for the essentials and not for luxuries. It is counting on "local ingenuity and cooperation" to supplement the bare minimum.

USO has been disbanded, but the Red Cross, YMCA's, service clubs, church organizations, and others are expected to aid in providing a "home away from home" for the young draftees.

Construction Bids Asked for Church

Sealed bids were being asked Friday by a Portland architectural firm for construction of the proposed new First Church of Christ, Scientist, at Fourteenth Ave. and Pearl St. in Eugene.

The bids are being called by Burns, Bear & McNeil, and will be opened at 2 p.m. July 29. The firm is asking for separate bids on general work, electrical work and plumbing and heating.

Church officials estimated cost of the new building at \$200,000. Plans, specifications and contract documents may be examined at the architects' office, 3804 N.E. Broadway, Portland. A deposit of \$50 will be required for contract documents.

Coombs Gets 4 Years For Using Bad Check

Neil Victor Coombs, 26, pleaded guilty Friday and was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary for obtaining property under false pretenses.

Judge G. F. Skipworth passed sentence after considering Coombs' previous record of check offenses and the fact that he was on probation when he purchased a used car with a worthless check. Coombs waived indictment and time for sentencing.

Youth Steals Goods From Sporting Store

Goods valued at \$100 were stolen from the Hendershott Sporting Goods store, 770 Willamette, Wednesday night. Nearly all of the stolen articles were recovered.

Arthur Hendershott, owner, said that a youth hid away in the store before closing hours. Later, he collected the goods, and sawed his way out.

The boy's brother found out about the stolen articles, and anonymously told the proprietor where the goods could be recovered.

Timber Sales On Next Week

Willamette National Forest Service will conduct two timber auctions next week, on July 12 and 15.

The auction July 12 will include 2,500,000 board feet of Douglas fir and other species located in the Oakridge ranger district on the north fork of the Willamette. Known as the Christy Flat sale, it involves timber on 600 acres. Because it is a salvage sale, the timber is appraised at only \$1.00 per thousand.

The July 15 sale includes 1,650,000 board feet of timber about three miles west of McKenzie Bridge. This also is a salvage sale, with Douglas fir appraised at \$5.70; hemlock and other species at \$3.50.

Both sales will be conducted at 2 p.m. in forest service offices in the Eugene Postoffice.

Concert Ends Session Of Junior Musicians

The first annual summer music course for Oregon high school students will end at the University of Oregon Friday night with a band-orchestra concert at 8 p.m. in the music auditorium on the University campus.

The three-week course saw a 50-piece band, a 50-piece orchestra and a 40-voice chorus, assembled from students of 40 Oregon high schools in public concerts and daily rehearsal. Students were given individual and section help by members of the faculty of the school of music.

The students, mostly high school lower-classmen, will return to their high schools this fall with new musical knowledge, and will help develop high school music programs, according to John Stehn, director of the band and orchestra.

The high school summer program will become a regular feature at the University because of the success of this initial venture, Mr. Stehn said.

(trips without a pay load), called an abuse by union men, were not eliminated by the board decision, which recommended withdrawal of the union demand for equal payment regardless of load.

Pay jumps for firemen and engineers on helper engines in freight service with locomotives above 100,000 pounds were approved as were new minimums for engineers and firemen (helpers) in yard service, hostlers and hostler helpers, and yard switch tenders.

Union efforts to standardize wage rates throughout the country were turned down, leaving, according to Mill, a situation where firemen in the South are paid far below the scale in other sections. Negroes are used for this work throughout the South.

A worker demand for company payment of watch cleaning costs was rejected by the board. Railmen are required to keep accurate watches and to have them cleaned periodically.

Further Study

Carried demands for favorable changes involving greater use of specialized mechanical equipment, elimination of "yard engine service," and loosening of union control of working assignments to prevent duplication were directed to consideration by both operators and workers.

Unsatisfied union demands will be discussed further. "We feel the standards of railroad work should stand equal with the overtime provisions of almost all other industry," said Mills Friday.

Better perhaps we should look for ourselves after this.



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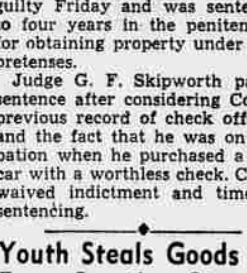
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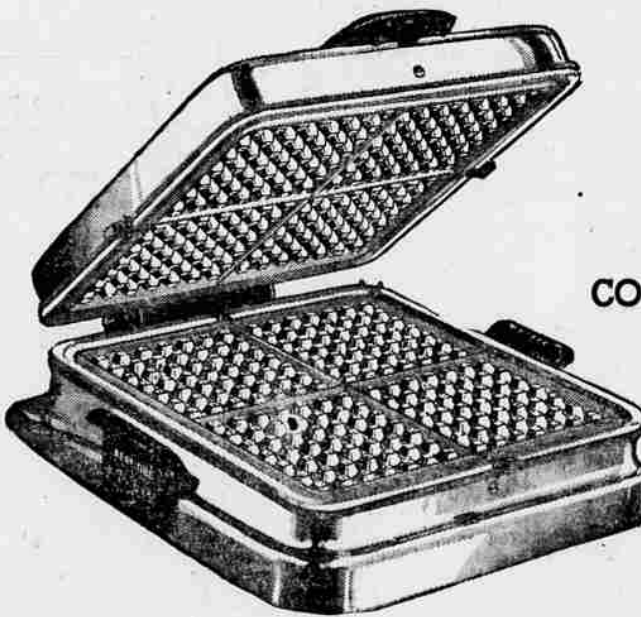
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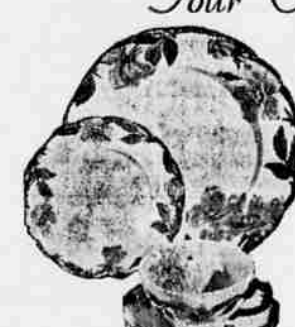
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
