Marcola's Theater to Be Rebuilt This Summer; Re-Opens in September

MARCOLA — Losing our theater through fire was a pretty hard blow, especially for the children, but cheer up, kids, you will soon be having shows again. Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Johnson, owners, are making plans for repairs which will start just as soon as carpenters are available. The interior was not damaged as much as at first feared—mostly from smoke and water. The projection booth and front of the building will be new—and fireproof. Re-opening date will be around Sept. 1.

Being inside looking out is fine sometimes, but not in a crowded building when fire breaks out. In this case there were no casualties but there could have been.

Special exit doors are required by law, but not one spectator used them in this fire.

Two boys remarked that they tried to enter the building by these doors to help but were unable to get in.

Special exit doors are built that way for a purpose: they cannot be opened from the outside, but will open from the inside with the slightest pressure.

Many fire casualties are caused by people losing their heads and all rushing for the front entrance which is usually not large enough to accommodate everybody at once. Small children and even adults may be pushed to the floor and trampled.

The thing to do "next time" (we hope never at Marcola) is to sit still for a moment and THINK, then make your way carefully to the NEAREST exit.

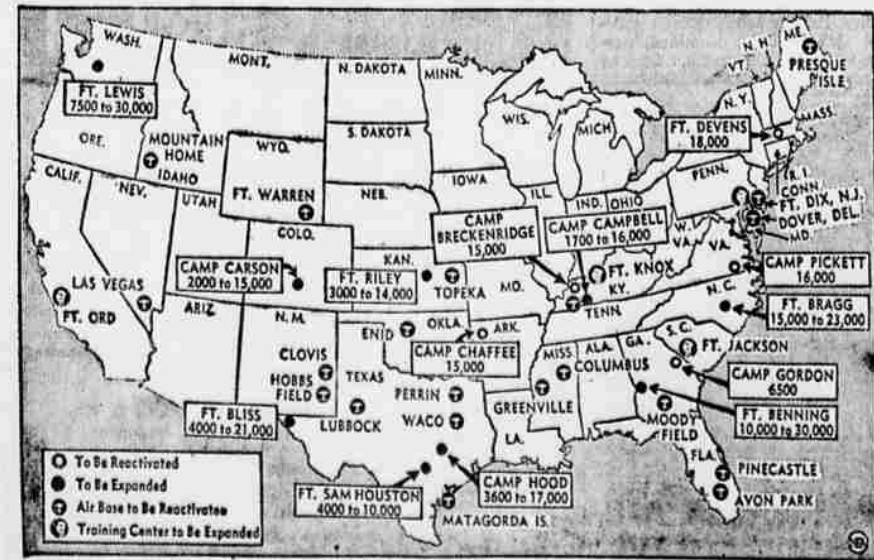

Map locates Army posts and air bases soon to be reactivated or expanded—some as much as eight times—to meet needs of the draft-expanding U. S. Army and Air Force. For reactivating Army posts, expected strength is given with station name. Both present and proposed new strength are shown for expanding posts. Of the 20 reopened air bases, one is a bombing and gunnery base on Matagorda Island, Tex. Present plans call for the Army to increase from 542,000 to 790,000 by July 1, 1950, and the Air Force from 221,000 to 440,000.
