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Springfield Council Sets Monday Date

SPRINGFIELD—A busy session is slated for the city council in its regular meeting here Monday, July 12, at 7:30 p.m.

Tops on the agenda will be the opening of sealed bids for the purchase of \$10,000 in general obligation bonds voted last May to finance an additional fire truck for the city.

In connection with the bonds will be the opening of bids for the purchase of the truck. Specifications call for a 750 gallon-per-minute triple combination pump-type truck which will bring the city's pumping capacity to the 1750 g.p.m. required by the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau in order to maintain the present fire insurance rates for residents here.

Many Bids

City Manager Fred Cheatham said six fire equipment firms have indicated they will submit bids for the truck.

Of greatest interest during the meeting, especially to residents in the new part of the city, will be council consideration and possible action on the city planning commission's recommendations for zoning the area recently annexed.

If the council accepts the planners' recommendations, the comprehensive zoning ordinance will be amended to include the new zoning plans.

Zoning Argued

Biggest point of contention in the proposed plans is the area on the south side of Main St. between Twentieth and Twenty Third St. which was scheduled as light industrial by the commission. Some businessmen in the new area desired the land to be zoned central business.

Also slated for council action Monday is a recommendation for the purchase of a heavy street grader provided in the 1948-49 budget.

The council will also consider city engineering proposals for the assessment of property owners for the installation of sidewalks on North D and E Sts. from Tenth to Fourteenth St. and on F St. from Tenth to Twelfth St.

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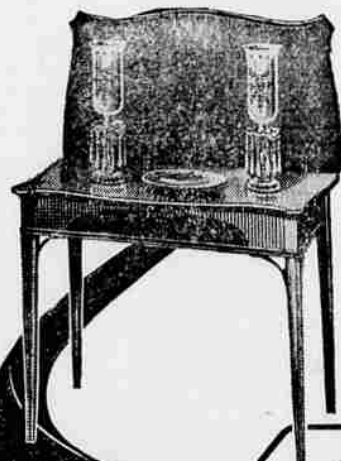

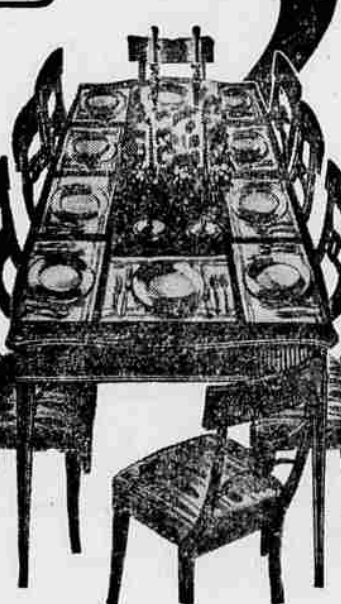
