Olympic Team Readies to Sail

Mal Whitfield May Be Surprise

\$10,000 Donated by Minor Baseball Leagues

NEW YORK, July 13.—(AP)—Talk of a big army sergeant with a seemingly endless store of endurance—Ohio State's Mal Whitfield—rose above all the confusion Tuesday as more than 300 of the United States' Olympic athletes went through final processing for the trip to London.

The major portion of the American delegation—to consist of 346 competitors and 63 officials—will sail for England Wednesday aboard the liner America. As they hurried through the routine of passports, medical examinations and amateur oaths, discussion in official quarters centered on the surprising Ohio State sophomore who scored a double in the Olympic track tryouts last week-end—in the 800 and 400 meter runs.

"He well could be the surprise of the Olympic Games," predicted Veteran Track Coach Dean Cromwell.

Spirits were high as representatives of 17 varied sports teams prepared to take off for the first post-war Olympiad, to be staged July 29 through August 14.

The entire Olympic project is expected to cost around half a million dollars and the executive committee announced this outlay has not been fully underwritten.

The committee said it still needed \$80,000.

George M. Trautman, president of the National Association of Minor Leagues, disclosed Monday night that the baseball leagues had contributed \$10,000 to help pay the expenses.

The Olympic headquarters gave a breakdown on the number going in each sport (athletes and officials listed in that order), which included:

Soccer 15-3; boxing 16-4; basketball 14-3; cycling 10-2; fencing 20-4; rowing 31-6; field hockey 16-0; gymnastics 16-5; men's swimming 21-3; women's track 8-2; women's swimming 11-3; men's track 65-9; wrestling 16-2; and yachting 16-0.

Singles in Two Runs

Players Demand Fines For All-Star Slackers

ST. LOUIS, July 13.—(AP)—Strong player protests placed the problem of absenteeism in baseball's all-star game in the lap of the bosses of the two big leagues Tuesday.

There was strong sentiment among the players for penalties against those who are chosen in the nationwide ballot but who refuse to participate.

The owners of the American and National League clubs took the complaints under consideration through their executive committee. One owner, Warren Giles of the Cincinnati Reds, said it was "high time" the all-star game got all-out support.

The players of six major league teams and the players' representatives of both leagues recommended penalties for players who duck the all-star assignment. Their opinion appeared to prefer fines to force the fans' favorites into the line-up.

The players left little doubt that their action was aimed at Bob Feller, pitcher for the Cleveland Indians, and Shortstop Marty Marion, of the St. Louis Cardinals, of the St. Louis Cardinals, who were the front office pulled him out to save him for a tough eastern trip; Marion said he had a sore back.

Williams Gains TKO Over Jack

Sixth Round Flurry Bests Former Champ

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—(AP)—Ike Williams finally found an opponent who didn't know what it meant to backtrack and the string bean kid from Trenton, N.J., used him as a medium to prove he's a great lightweight champion.

Williams scored a six-round technical knockout Monday night over Beau Jack, windmill-swinging former shoeshine boy who sought to make boxing history by becoming the first fighter ever to win the same title three times.

Each fighter entered the ring at 134 pounds.

A disappointing crowd of 12,952 paid \$83,787 at Shibe Park and saw the ever-advancing Jack swarmed all over the champion in the early rounds. Williams, jabbing and counter-punching, simply waited patiently for an opening.

In the sixth, the champion caught Jack with a left hook and, battering him with countless rights and lefts, pinned him against the ropes. Ike passed to Referee Charley Daggert to stop it but he said no.

Jack wanted to fall but he couldn't and finally Daggert stepped in and called a halt after 33 seconds of the round.

The battle had been fairly even to that point. Daggert had scored it two rounds for each and one even; Judge Frank Knarsborough carded three rounds for Williams and two for Jack, while Judge Harry Laszy saw Jack win three rounds and Williams two.

Williams said he planned to continue fighting as a lightweight, discounting rumors he would campaign for Ray Robinson's welterweight diadem.

A beaten and dejected Jack who had no excuse for his defeat said "of course I'll keep on fighting. Fighting is my life."
