Air Power Hoe Developed To Cut Farm Costs

SAN FRANCISCO —(U.P.)—One answer to higher agricultural production costs may be found in the air power hoe invented by Frank King, sugar beet grower.

Although the machine is mechanically practical, actual savings in operating costs are not known yet, says J. P. Fairbanks, University of California agricultural engineer who saw it demonstrated. He added that the savings would have to be high, because the hoe cost about \$165 each to make, plus the air compressor, cost of tractor, and driver's wages.

However, it replaces the drudgery of hand-hoeing and workers won't have a chance to lean on a handle and rest, he said.

Up to 20 rows can be weeded at

once. A tractor draws an air compressor slowly down the field with air hoses attached on each side. Each hoe is connected to a hose with a piston at the top of the handle. Compressed air jabs the blade back and forth much like a jack-hammer.

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
