Massachusetts Home Of New President BPW Federation

Dr. K. Frances Scott, associate professor of hygiene at Smith College, Northampton, Mass., was elected president of the National Federation of B & P Clubs at Fort Worth, Texas. Dr. Scott represented the National Federation at the Regional Convention at Sun Valley, Idaho, in July 1947 and at that time met many of the Western members. She also acted as chairman of the national health and safety committee during the Fort Worth convention. Before the election she stated that if she was chosen president that her major goal would be to work "even harder" for the equal rights amendment to the Constitution which forbids any discrimination on the basis of sex. She would continue to work for support of the United Nations.

Elected for the offices are first vice-president District Judge Sarah T. Hughes, Dallas, Texas, who was a colorful figure during the convention in her striking cowboy outfit with green tie; Miss Ethel Murray Johnstone of San Francisco was chosen second vice-president, she attended the Oregon convention in June as representative of the National Federation; third vice-president Miss Helen G. Irwin, Des Moines, Iowa; recording secretary Miss Lula K. Baum, Leavenworth, Kansas; treasurer, Miss Maude Doyle, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Of interest to the Oregon members was the voting for the 1950 convention when San Francisco was chosen as the convention city.

Recipe

MEXICAN RABBIT ON CRISP CRACKERS: Measure about 1/2 cup ripe olives and cut away the olive meat from the pits in as large pieces as possible. Heat 1 1/2 tablespoons salad or olive oil and cook 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper and 2 tablespoons chopped onion in it lightly. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of flour over the vegetables and stir well to coat them; now add 3/4-cup canned tomatoes, 1 cup whole kernel corn, 1 teaspoon salt and a grinding of black pepper, and 1/4-teaspoon of chili powder (more if desired). Cook over low heat until thickened and bubbly. Beat 2 eggs lightly and add slowly to hot mixture, stirring constantly over very low heat, until eggs are done, about 5 to 10 minutes. Blend in the olives and a cup of grated cheese and serve over crisp salted crackers. Makes 4 servings.

THOUSAND ISLE DRESSING

1 cup mayonnaise or mayonnaise-type salad dressing
1/4 cup chili sauce
2 tablespoons finely-chopped green pepper
1/4 cup finely-chopped pimento-stuffed olives
1/4 cup finely-chopped celery
1 tablespoon finely grated onion, if desired
2 hard-cooked eggs
Put the salad dressing in a bowl and add the chili sauce, green pepper, olives, celery and onion (if used). Rice the eggs into the bowl. Makes about 2 cups, enough for 6 to 8 servings from a salad bowl to which no other dressing has been added.

Care of Screens Is Small Item But Important One

Curtains and drapes are easily soiled when they contact dust-laden window screens. Cleaning the wire mesh regularly will save laundry bills on expensive fabrics, and will help to prevent the splattering of window sills and paint during rainy weather.

To clean wire screening quickly and easily, use the dusting attachment of the vacuum cleaner. A soft-bristled brush will also give satisfactory results.

A thorough cleaning often exposes even the tiniest of screen holes, which provide a large enough entrance for many pest insects. Small holes can be repaired with ready-made screen patches, available at any hardware or five and ten cent store. The patches have tiny hooks which grip the surrounding mesh tightly.

After screens have been cleaned and repaired, wipe off the wire mesh with benzine, and apply a rust-inhibiting coat of varnish.

thinned with linseed oil and turpentine. This mixture keeps the wire mesh openings from clogging and stopping the circulation of air. Finally, to prevent mosquitoes and flies from swarming into the house, check screen frames for snug fit.

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
