On Opening Night, VLT Will See Dream Become A Reality

On the eve of the opening of VLT's latest production—the variety show "Stuff and Nonsense," Dorothy Parks Scott, retiring president, will turn over to the new president, Marvin Krenk and the new board of directors the large tract on Hilyard street between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth which bears a bright new sign "Future Home of Eugene's Very Little Theatre."

Purchased out of earnings, the building site has an entire block of frontage on Hilyard Street, and it runs back to the large Amazon park site which the people of Eugene through Century Fund acquired last year and gave to the city for future development.

"After 20 years of work and service to the community," said Mrs. Scott, "the Very Little Theatre is well on its way to achieving that permanent building which has been its dream from the beginning."

"It may be another three years before we will be able to start actual construction, because after paying for this site we have only about \$5,000 in the building reserve. But we have the incentive to give more shows and better shows, and if the Lord is good to us and the old playhouse at the Fairgrounds doesn't burn down or fall down, we'll make it."

Preliminary designs for a completely fireproof building with all of the latest and most efficient theatrical machinery have been drawn by Architect Claire Hamlin. Planning Consultant Howard Buford has prepared a ground layout, including parking space for VLT patrons and landscaping of the entire grounds in harmony with the adjacent park.

It will require a minimum of \$40,000 cash to erect the main auditorium, stage and basic facilities, and it may require twice that amount to complete the theatre to

Milk Agreement Mullied by City

Discussions of a reciprocal agreement between the Eugene milk inspection service and that of the state department of agriculture were held Thursday night in a joint meeting of the City Health Commission and the health committee of the city council.

Such an agreement would, if adopted, provide for state inspection of milk coming to Eugene from distant points. In return the city's inspectors would control milk processed in Eugene for outside distribution, thus relieving the state inspectors.

E. L. Peterson, head of the department of agriculture, attended the meeting which may be followed by formal recommendations to the city council from the health commission.

Questions as to the types of inspection provided by both services were gone over by the commissioners, and City Manager Deane Seeger reported that should the reciprocal agreement be concluded, the city would be in a position to use budget savings resulting from elimination of heavy mileage costs for additional laboratory testing.

FHA Accepting New Loan Bids

Farmers Home Administration in Eugene now is accepting applications for new loans on this year's funds for production and subsistence, livestock and equipment, and water facilities.

To be eligible for a loan at 5 per cent, a family must be unable to secure adequate credit from other sources. Loans made by the Farmers Home Administration, a federal agency, are based on the farm and home plan of operation, taking into consideration the needs of a particular farm. The loans are "supervised" by the administration, with efforts toward improved farm management, tures and the use of fertilizers for better livestock, improved pastures and increased crop production.

Interested persons may obtain information from Norman Fletcher at the Farmers Home Administration office in Eugene Postoffice. The office is open Mondays through Fridays.

Recap Shows County Eight Disease Deaths

Lane County had eight deaths in May from communicable diseases, the Oregon Health Bulletin for July reported Friday. Two were from tuberculosis, five from pneumonia-influenza, and one from syphilis.

The county also had 11 infant deaths in that month, bringing the total from January through the current month to 36. Total for the same period in 1947 was 35.

Sheriff's Office Has Busy Week

The sheriff's office reported a busy week Friday with eight cases sent to district court in the last two days.

Howard B. Lowery, 51, was arraigned on a charge of forgery, waived preliminary hearing, and was jailed for want of \$2500 bail.

Anthony E. Foster, 26, was arraigned on charges of obtaining money and property under false pretenses and jailed with bail fixed at \$1500.

George R. Lovely, 40, was arraigned on a charge of obtaining property under false pretenses and committed. Bail was set at \$1500. Joe Krpalik, 45, was bound over to the grand jury with bail fixed at \$1500, for action on an information accusing him of contributing to the delinquency.

Jack Murphy, 31, was arraigned and freed on his own recognizance until Monday, when he will enter his plea to a charge of malicious destruction of property. He is accused of entering the home of his divorced wife and breaking up furniture.

Don Northey, 23, pleaded not guilty to a charge of larceny from an auto and will be tried at a later date. Frank Long, 21, pleaded guilty to a similar charge and was given a year's probation. Clarence Moore, 20, also involved in thefts from autos, was given a year's probation.

Amusement Tax Take Gives County \$869

Lane County's second quarter share of state amusement tax revenue, distributed Friday by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, came to \$869, an Associated Press report from Salem showed.

The total of \$42,884 was collected in April, May and June. Of this amount, \$17,153 went to the counties, and \$25,730 to the state public assistance fund.

Other county shares included Multnomah's \$7,107, and Marion's \$1279.
