Veneta parents and patrons of the Elmira Union High School are called to attention in regard to a special school election at the high school on July 21, for the purpose of voting on whether or not to exceed the six per cent limitation by \$47,623.18. This amount includes a serial levy of \$3000 for replacement of buses and building alterations. Both the serial levy and the budget were approved by the voters at the election on January 13, 1948. The results of this election showed 19 for the budget and two against, and for the serial levy 17 for and four against.

The question may be asked why it is necessary to vote on the issues again. Because our school census is now over 1000 and the budget did not come under the control of the Rural School Board. The polls will be open for this election from 3 to 7 p. m. (DST).

JUNCTION CITY — Farmers and townspeople are invited to come to the new seed and feed warehouse of the Farmers Warehouse, Inc., for an open house celebration, Saturday, July 17, 1-9 p.m. The invitation comes from Manager E. H. Jefferson, who points out that the new building has many unique features of the most modern developments, and one of the first of its kind.

It is a trussed structure with aluminum roof and siding, 80x120. There is a ramp to permit loads to be driven directly into the warehouse. The five and a half inch-thick concrete floor stands on a foundation of a 30 to 36 inch rock fill. The structure has an estimated capacity of 40 to 45 carloads.

COTTAGE GROVE — The Rodeo queen will be selected at the Queen's Ball Saturday evening at the local Armory.

The Creswell Riding Club are sponsoring Rose Marie Malone of Creswell; The Arizona Ranch Hands are sponsoring Clara Barrett of Lowell; The Girl's Posse are sponsoring Janice Billings of Eugene and the Cottage Grove Riding club are sponsoring Doreen Lyons of Cottage Grove.

Each dance ticket that a princess sell counts for votes for her. Tickets will be sold up to 8 p.m. Saturday.

The queen will reign during the rodeo being sponsored by the Cottage Grove Riding club July 31 and August 1. She is to be crowned during the dance by Wally Robertson, president of the Chamber of Commerce. Interest in the rodeo which will include both professional and amateur events is quite wide spread.

The track will be completed this week. The program will include all the major attraction for professionals including brahma bull riding and fighting, bareback and saddle bronch riding, calf roping and bulldozing.

For the amateurs there will be bareback riding and steer riding, a quarter horse race, stake race for saddle clubs, one-half mile race, one-fourth mile race for boys, one-fourth mile stock horse for girls and a three-eighth relay race. Entry fees will be collected for each event and cash prizes will be awarded.

The rodeo stock will be furnished by Christensen Brothers. Points earned by professionals in the rodeo count towards the world's championships.

Mrs. Grace Markham of Eugene has been assisting the club by soliciting advertising for the rodeo programs. She was in charge of advertising for the Junior Rodeo and has had some other experience in this field.

Noti Voters Study School Finances

NOTI — There will be a school election at the Elmira Union High School Wednesday, July 21 from 2 to 7 p. m. (DST), to vote on the budget for the ensuing year, which amounts to \$59,911.09. At the request of the rural school board, it was voted on Jan. 12, 1948 and was approved. But later it was found it would not come under the control of said board, because the school census of this district was more than 1000. Accordingly an election on June 28, to exceed the six per cent limitation was voted down by a vote of seven for and nine against. Many people failed to vote who did not know these facts, which accounts for the small vote cast.

What would happen if this measure fails again to be passed by the voters? The district would have to pay its bills by warrants, by an additional levy from the following year's taxes, which alone would amount to \$1904.93.

In 1932 there were 102 students and four teachers. Last year there were 210 students and nine teachers. When these facts are understood, and the patrons realize the necessity for the budget passing, a large turnout of voters should pass the budget without a dissenting vote.
