YMCA Directors Plan for Center

During the month of August the "Y" Community Center will be closed each day at 5 p.m. and at 1 p.m. on Saturdays, the YMCA board of directors decided Friday noon.

Recommendation of the YMCA-YWCA policy committee that this move be taken was approved, and the board also approved a recom- mendation of the joint co-educational committee that canteen ses- sions be omitted during August. They will resume Sept. 10.

When the canteens for senior and junior high school students reopen, the YMCA will be re- sponsible for the Friday night gatherings of the junior high school students, and the YMCA will assume responsibility for Skyline Club activities Saturday nights for senior high students.

Another proposal that some or- ganized activities for teen-age boys and girls during week-day after school hours be organized was acted on favorably by the board. A plan also may be put into effect whereby volunteer help will replace hired help in the canteen work in order to reduce canteen expenses.
