COBURG—The Deardorff brooder plant located in Coburg now possesses a grade A license. The plant cares for between 7000 and 8000 chickens all of the time. The fowls are slaughtered when about two months old and are marketed close by, some of them supplying Eugene restaurants.

The new processing room is completely modern, lined with aluminum, and has a concrete floor. Equipment includes a new electric picker, funnel killer, sterilizer and electric scalding, a steel tank for cooling and a dressing table of steel.

MONTREAL—Six vampire jet fighters of the Royal Air Force were at St. Hubert airport here Saturday after completing the first Trans-Atlantic jet flight in aviation history.

The flight arrived here Friday night after an overnight delay at Goose Bay, Labrador, where they rendezvoused with 16 United States F-80 jet fighters bound for Germany.

The American Shooting Stars were still at Goose Bay. They had delayed their takeoff as an international courtesy to allow the British the honor of making the first Trans-Atlantic jet crossing.

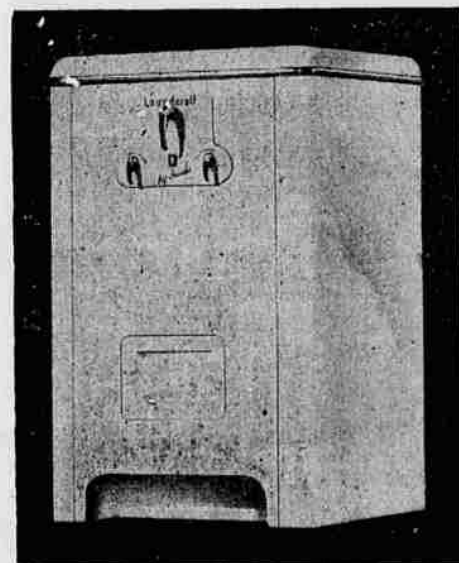
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
