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Yoncalla Man Killed by Train

William Merritt Luster, 42, Yoncalla, was killed when the light truck he was driving stalled on the Southern Pacific tracks at the Thompson Mill crossing one mile north of Yoncalla.

Luster had driven from home and was backing the truck to the hill to get wood. He apparently became excited when he saw the engine coming down the track, and stalled the car motor. He tried to jump from the truck at the moment of impact, but could not escape.

A resident of Yoncalla the past three years, he is survived by his widow, Mary; two sisters and five brothers in the middle west and east. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Eagles Lodge at Cottage Grove.

Minnesota Farmers Find Prosperity

ST. PAUL, Minn.—(U.P.)—Minnesota's farmers are worth \$5,000,000,000.
A report on farm assets by Rex W. Cox, University of Minnesota agricultural economist, shows that the state's farm wealth has skyrocketed from \$2,228,000,000 in 1940 to an all-time high of about \$5,000,000,000 today.
Farm acreage in the eight-year period has increased only 1.3 per cent, but the value of a single acre of land has shot up 83 per cent since 1940.

Cox attributes the rapid rise to price increases. Adding to the picture, he says, is the current low indebtedness of farmers, in contrast with their plunge into debt after World War I.

Clipper Clipped in Half Comes Together Again

BOSTON.—(U.P.)—The New Haven Railroad's fast train, the Yankee Clipper, had to be clipped in half to get it out of South Station when a locomotive was derailed on a parallel track.
Half of the Yankee Clipper could get past the jutting catch-catcher of the locomotive, so yard workers unhitched the train in the middle.
The head end continued to another station. The tail end was pulled back, shuttled to another track, and the two ends were joined one hour and 10 minutes later.

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Southern Polio Toll Increases

RALEIGH, N. C., (U.P.)—Another emergency hospital threw open its doors Monday as North Carolina's polio outbreak, now the second worst in state history, continued flooding existing facilities.
The toll in the nation's heaviest epidemic this year stood at 679 cases, Saturday's reports of 23 new victims kicked the current onslaught ahead of the 1935 epidemic in which 676 persons fell to infantile paralysis.

A convalescent center hurriedly established at Camp Sutton in Monroe opened Sunday a day ahead of schedule.

Dr. J. W. R. Norton, state health officer, labeled the 163 airline miles between Raleigh and Asheville a "well-defined" epidemic area and asked residents of non-infected counties to stay out of the polio-stricken midsection.

Weather Brings Low Price of Pork
Warm weather is here! The price of pork should be down this week. Cattle prices are still high and will probably continue to be so until fall.

Berries Coming And Going
You'll be mighty lucky if you find many raspberries in the markets after this week, but as raspberries go out loganberries come in. This week the price is lowest and quality best. Most any variety of loganberries will bring satisfactory freezing results. After washing and draining, pack and cover the berries with syrup.

Local Apricots Are Here
This is the last week for California apricots, but don't despair because there will be plenty of apricots shipped into Eugene from The Dalles and Yakima. The varieties we recommend for best freezing results are Royal, Blenheim, Tilton, Wenatchee and Moorpark. After halving and pitting, either dip the fruit into boiling water for 1/2 minute or add ascorbic acid to the proportion of 1/4 teaspoon to each pint of fruit. By adding ascorbic acid to the simple syrup, fruit discoloration is prevented.
When prices are lowest, you save if you buy foods in quantities, and you save by avoiding wasted foods. While the average family throws out unused portions, you just freeze them.

Wait A While For Vegetables
California peas have gone up in price (what there are of them still left). We suggest waiting another two weeks when local peas from the coast will be on the market. The price should then be low enough to make freezing pay off in dividends. The price of green beans and corn is much too high. It will probably be another two weeks before beans are plentiful and a month until corn goes down in price.
