

## City Accepts Fire Truck Bids

SPRINGFIELD — The city council in an adjourned meeting here Monday night accepted the bid of the Mack International Motor Co. for a 1000 gallon-per-minute pumper type fire truck.

The Mack Co.'s bid was \$15,318.40, about \$40 more than the bid of the American Elkhart Co. but City Manager Fred Cheatham recommended the Mack because of the past performance of the city's present Mack fire truck and because a volunteer party have similar equipment to operate.

The new truck was provided by a \$19,000 bond issue voted in May to enable the city to retain present fire insurance rates.

The council passed a resolution cancelling their acceptance of the bid for the bonds made last week by the Springfield branch of the U. S. National Bank of Portland and awarded the bid to Blythe and Co. Inc. of Portland. The city re-figured interest rates and estimated the bid of Blythe and Co. Inc. would save the city about \$163.

An engineering survey and proposed assessment plans were ordered by the council in resolutions calling for construction of sewers as follows: blocks one through 5 of the Nicholas Gardens addition; block two, second addition to Nicholas Gardens; between Clover Lane and Memorial Drive from Walnut to Ash St.; blocks

## SP Promotes J. W. Corbett

An early Eugene Railroad man, J. W. Corbett, is the new vice president in charge of operations for Southern Pacific Company. He succeeds the late L. B. McDonald.

Corbett was assistant superintendent of the company's Portland division with an office in Eugene during 1937-39 and was division superintendent in 1941-42. A sister, Mrs. George Schaeffers, lives in Eugene.

R. E. Halliwell, who has been assistant general manager the last four years, was named general manager to succeed Corbett.

V. M. Petterson, also a former Lane County railroader, moves up from his position as superintendent of the company's Rio Grande division to succeed Halliwell as assistant general manager.

Corbett started with Southern Pacific in 1915 as a telegrapher after four years experience with the Union Pacific and moved up the line through the Portland Division from relief agent, to train dispatcher in Sacramento, division examiner, and trainmaster. He was named assistant superintendent of the Portland division in 1937 and up the line to general manager in 1944.

Chief Surfus said five shirts and three pair of trousers will be purchased for each member of the department with the \$60 per man uniform allotment provided in the current city budget.

The work uniforms will be purchased from a local supplier, Surfus said, and will be obtained as soon as possible.

## Insurance Exams Needed After July

July 31st will be the last day for veterans to reinstate their lapsed GI Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis. This information, in the form of a warning to veterans with lapsed insurance, was issued by Kenneth L. Farnor, Veterans Administration representative for this area.

Before August 1, term policies can be stored in most instances without a physical examination. Only steps necessary are a short-three-question form which certifies that the veteran's health is as good now as when his policy lapsed, and payment of two months' premiums.

After July 31, veterans still may reinstate service policies, but if they have lapsed for more than three months a physical will be required.
