So many wedding anniversaries occur in the summer months, the society department has had numerous requests for the designations of certain anniversaries, and perhaps it would be helpful to reprint the listing of the anniversaries. We suggest clipping and pasting them inside the dictionary or atlas for reference.

Starting with the first year, each anniversary has a special name through the fifteenth; then they jump by fives all the way to the fiftieth. After the "golden" wedding, only the sixtieth and seventy-fifth are noted. We list them all:

First, paper; second, calico; third, leather, or muslin; fourth, silk.

Fifth, wood; sixth, iron; seventh, copper or woolen; eighth, electric appliances; ninth, pottery.

Tenth, formerly tin, now aluminum; eleventh, steel; twelfth, linen; thirteenth, lace; fourteenth, ivory.

Fifteenth, crystal. Twentieth, silver. Twenty-fifth, silver. Thirtieth, pearl.

Thirty-fifth, coral and jade. Fortieth, ruby. Forty-fifth, sapphire. Fiftieth, golden.

Sixtieth and seventy-fifth, both diamond.

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Girl Scout Staff Busy With Duties At Lake Cleawox

From camp nurse to camp cooks, they're all appointed and on the job! Completion of the staff for Camp Cleawox, summer home of the Girl Scouts of the Three Rivers district, was announced recently by Camp Director Janet Stutz. A couple of dozen capable and eager workers are on hand at the camp down on the coast to direct the activities of Scouts from ten to eighteen years old. The first contingent of these camping Scouts arrived at Camp Cleawox a week ago Monday, and found things all ready with the staff set for a summer of fun.

First of all considerations is safety for the several hundred girls who enjoy the privileges of Camp Cleawox during the four summer sessions. This safety was guarded, first of all by the health examinations given before the girls leave home. Camp nurse is Elizabeth Jay, Denver, Colo., a registered nurse who was graduated in 1942 from St. Francis Hospital, Peoria, Ill. She spent three years in the Army Nurses Corps during the war stationed in New Guinea, and has had five years of camp experience.

Coralle Thomson of Vida is director of the waterfront. Assisting her in guarding the safety of the Girl Scouts on and in the water is Donna Little of West Linn. Both girls are college students. Miss Thomson, University of Oregon, is a grown-up Girl Scout who has had experience at Camp Cleawox both as a camper and as a counselor. Miss Little had experience with the Campfire Girls. She goes to Oregon State College.

Nourishing meals are an important part of the camp health program. On the staff to cook these meals are Mrs. R. D. Bruce and Mrs. Evelyn Worman, both of Springfield.

Assisting Mrs. Stutz in "keeping tabs" on all the activities of the camp is Helen M. McDuffee, Danville, Ill. She has been a Girl Scout leader for twelve years and has had considerable experience in camp, both as a counselor and director. She is a graduate of Battle Creek College.
